**LIVER SAUSAGE CASSEROLE**  
1 pound liver sausage  
1 tablespoon mustard  
1 tablespoon onion juice  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 cup fine cracker crumbs  
1 egg, beaten  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1/2 cup grapefruit juice  
1/2 cup cooked green peas  
Mash liver sausage with fork. Add seasonings and mix well. Combine remaining ingredients and mix with liver sausage mixture. Place in well greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 25 minutes. 6 servings.
