

Seven Highway Bids Awarded In Camp Adair Area; 12th Street Paving Set by Board

PORTLAND, June 4 (AP)—The Oregon state highway commission, gearing its road program to the nation's war effort, approved contracts totaling \$1,300,000 but rejected a \$522,918 job for the Camp Adair area.

The commission awarded, or referred to the state highway engineer with power to award, projects on the West Side Pacific highway to serve the army cantonment in the Corvallis area.

The rejected bid was submitted by McNutt Bros., Eugene, for 2.52 miles of grading and 9.08 miles of paving on the highway between Monmouth and the Benton county line.

Four additional contracts awarded or referred were for federal aid projects to facilitate handling of increasing shipyard traffic in the Portland area. Two contracts were for improvement of the Willamette highway in Lane county.

War-time expenditures, said the commission in a statement, will be confined to "administration, surveys, preparation of plans and acquisition of right-of-way for post-war work, and essential maintenance of the present highway system."

All jobs not essential to the war effort should be suspended for the duration, the commission said.

The commission will confer with the state land department some time before its next meeting on leasing to private mining interests chrome-bearing sands of southern Oregon beaches.

The commission withdrew a \$1500 grant to state-owned radio station KOAC at Oregon State

college. The money was to have been for tourist promotion.

E. L. Gray of Independence requested the commission to set out the location of a bridge over the Willamette river between the towns of Monmouth and Independence. The matter was referred to the engineer.

C. H. Watzek of the Roaring River Logging company headed a delegation which requested improvement of a three-mile stretch of road near Scio. The road was needed for logging operations in northern Linn county, he said.

Two Convicted Of Espionage

LOS ANGELES, June 4 (AP)—Dr. Hans Helmut Gros, 34, German-educated native of Minneapolis, and his Kansas-born, Los Angeles-educated wife, Frances Goellert Gros, 31, were convicted of espionage Thursday.

They are liable to maximum sentences of 20 years each, and Gros to five more for conviction on a second charge of failing to register as a foreign agent.

Albrecht Rudolf Curt Reuter, 56, indicted with them, was freed Wednesday. Federal Judge Ben Harrison said evidence against him was insufficient. He was a Beverly Hills, Calif., art dealer.

Both Gros and his wife denied that they sent information of value to Germany.

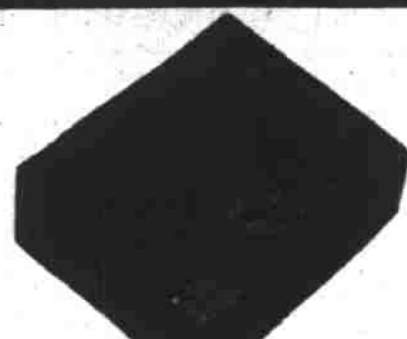
