Senate Group **Demands Farm Prices Floor**

WASHINGTON, June 11-(AP) Spurred to action by recent declines in market prices for some in ruins. major farm crops, the senate agriculture committee Thursday demanded that the government put a floor under prices of basic agricultural commodities at levels charred walls open to the skies. well above the present average.

After a brief closed door session, the senate group approved women patiently operating a bill by Senators Bankhead (D-Ala) and Russell (D-Ga) that would require a full parity loan on this year's cotton, corn, wheat, the main battlefield dominated rice, tobacco and peanut crops.

On the basis of latest agriculture department calculations of parity prices, this would mean a farmer could store his wheat, for instance, and get a government loan of \$1.34 a bushel on it, whereas the average market price to farmers in mid-May was reported by the department at 99.8






