

Valley School Districts To Elect on Monday, June 15

WOODBURN — Annual election will be held by the Woodburn school district Monday afternoon in the Lincoln grade school, beginning at 2 o'clock.

Terms of Dr. Gerald Smith, school director, and Frank Proctor, clerk, expired this year. A school director's term is for three years while the clerk of the board is elected each year.

The clerk has been receiving \$480 per year, but the budget committee has increased the figure to \$500, beginning with the new fiscal year. The directors serve without pay.

Under law the polls must be kept open at least until 3 o'clock on Monday. But in recent years it has been customary to keep them open much longer.

Lebanon Plans For Hospital

LEBANON — Registered nurses in Lebanon held a meeting Wednesday afternoon to plan for the emergency auxiliary hospital being organized. It will be set up in the high school gymnasium and six rows of beds will be set up, 20 beds in a row. In addition there will be rooms for cases needing to be isolated.

Surgical cases after an x-ray at the office of Drs. Miller and Booth will be taken to the Lebanon General hospital. In case of an emergency convalescents will be transferred to the auxiliary hospital or sent to their homes.

Drs. Irvine and Herren will be in charge of surgery at the general hospital. Dr. Booth will have charge of the emergency hospital. Two registered nurses and several nurses' aids will be on duty in the auxiliary hospital at all times.

Funds for the purchase of drugs and instruments are being donated by various clubs and unions.

Wohlheter Funeral to Be Friday

97 Year Old Native of France Dies at Marion Home

WOODBURN — Mrs. Caroline Wohlheter died Wednesday morning at the family home on Boone's Ferry road northwest of Woodburn. Her age was 97 years, 1 month and 27 days.

Mrs. Wohlheter was born in Havre, France, on April 13, 1845, and had lived in the United States for the past 94 years. In 1908 she moved to Woodburn from Nebraska.

She is survived by sons, Louis and Eugene F. Wohlheter of Woodburn and granddaughter Vera Seime of Oakland, Calif.

Recitation of the rosary was held Thursday evening at 8 o'clock at the Ringo mortuary. Funeral services will be held in St. Luke's church Friday morning at 9 o'clock and burial will be in Belle Passi cemetery beside the body of her husband, Valentine Wohlheter, who died several years ago.
