Senators Spank Tigers Again On Three-Hit Effort by Moore

3-1 Victory Gives Salem Eight Of Last Nine Starts; Riotous Seventh Sees Adams Chased

Eight wins in their last nine ball games—that's the story of our Senators this morning after Tillamook Bud Moore got through with the Tacoma Tigers last night at George E. Waters park, where he rammed a three-hit 3 to 1 game at the Tigers and knocked 'em right out of the Western International league leadership. Of course Vancouver's 17-0 win over Spokane helped Bud hurl the Tigs into second place, but he needed only the help of his mates for his sixth win of the season against three setbacks.

And Bud got that help in the way of a ninth inning double play starting with Bill Johnson, through Alf Caliteaux and winding up with Jack Richards, after his control, which had been faulty all night, took to the worst side and saw two of the eight free passes issued come in the final frame.

A heads-up play on the part of Caliteaux pulled Bud out of a bad jam in a riotous seventh, too, and it retired the side at that.

After our side had built up a 2-0 lead on the strength of a walk from Chet Johnson to Eddie Adams to lead off the second, followed by Manager Pete's slash to left, another by Caliteaux, driving in Adams, another walk and an error in the fourth, good for the other run, Tacoma finally got under way in the seventh.

Rooney was safe at first when Moore hit him in the back after fielding his drag-bunt. Bud fanned LoForte but Manager Pip Koehler lashed a line double into left center scoring Rooney with the unearned run. Spurgeon went down swinging but Bud passed pitcher Johnson. He had two strikes on Youngman and broke a beautiful curve across what looked like the middle of the plate, but Umpire Ed Harris didn't think so and bellered "ball." Eddie Adams bellered too, but his vocal efforts got him no place but chased out of the game for protesting. Manager Pete joined in the chorus and came within a hair of getting the thumb himself.

Youngman cracked Moore's next serve through the hole between Caliteaux and Richards, but Jack made a diving stop of the ball, deflecting it toward Caliteaux. It went for a hit but Caliteaux saw Koehler striding too far off third, pegged true to Bill Johnson and Koehler was out by an eyelash to retire the side.

Ten Tacomans didn't like Amby Moran's call on that play at all, and it took the playing of the seventh-inning rendition of the National Anthem to stem the Tiger surge towards Moran's neck.

Our side got its final tally in the eighth when Warren was safe after LoForte dropped his pop-up, and Richards followed through with a "bad hop" three-base hit to right.

The victory gave the Solons a 3-1 edge in the series.

Moore fogged along in fine fashion for five innings with nary a hit being made off his serves. Enemy pitcher Johnson led off the sixth with a bash to left for the first hit, and Koehler's double and Youngman's infield single in the uproarious seventh was as far as the hits went for the Tigers.

The teams do battle again tonight starting at 8 p. m. and will wind up the series on Sunday with a doubleheader starting at 1:30 p. m.

The win also brought the Senators to the .511 mark, just three games out of first place.

Previously this season Big Game won the 2,500 guineas and Sun Chariot the 1,000 guineas.

Trouble Brews In State Game Meet Today

PORTLAND, June 12—(P)—A battle between Oregon hunting factions over a proposal to develop deer and elk seasons appeared developing Friday as the state game commission set Saturday for arguments.

Generally, western Oregon hunters indicated support of the proposal with eastern Oregon delegations lined up against it.

Arguments for included: relief from fire and gasoline conditions, taking of more deer and elk from areas where they have increased most, more opportunity for hunters to lay in bigger supplies of meat for cold storage.

Arguments against included: increased numbers of hunters in woods at one time, animals out of condition, increased meat spoilage because of long single season in warmer weather.

Ordinarily the deer season opens around September 20 and extends to October 25 while elk season is November 1-15. The new plan would extend the deer season about one week and the elk season would be moved up proportionately.

In addition to the hunters' arguments Saturday the commission will consider military, forest fire and range factors presented by the army and forest service. A decision about two weeks later was indicated.

Friday's commission session took up routine matters.

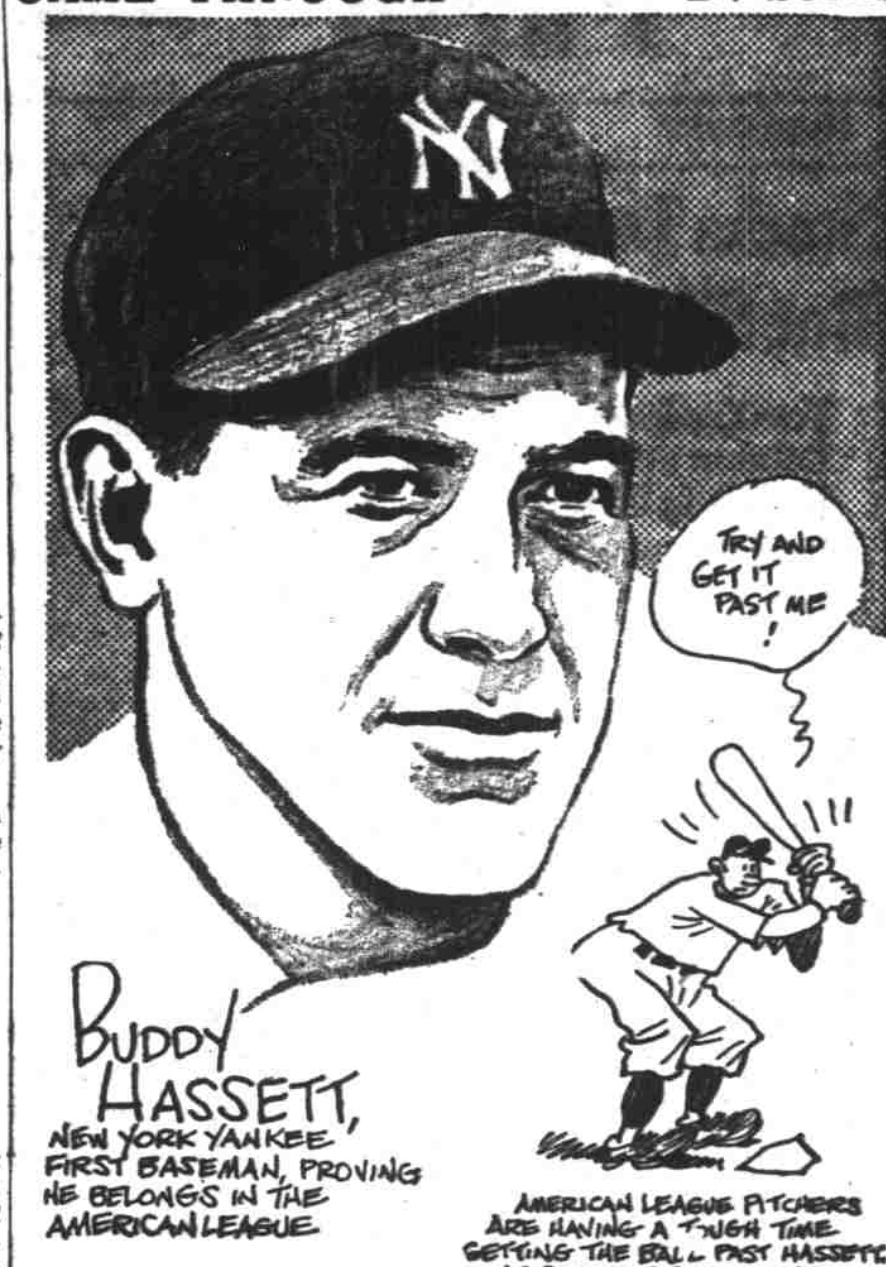

After four losses Olsen defeated Al Javery. It was Javery's sixth defeat. Lou Novikoff maintained his new hitting pace with two singles.

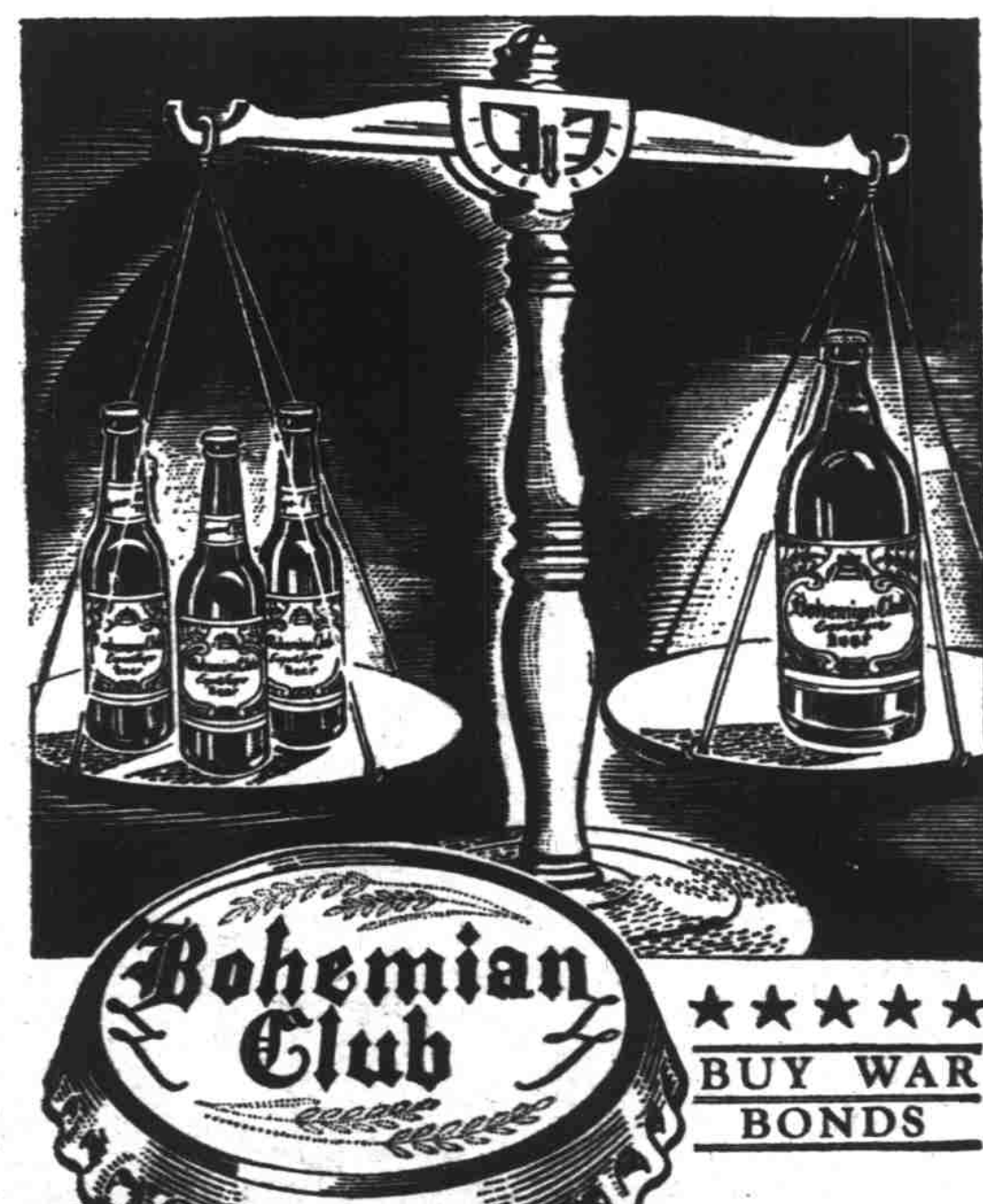
