

Stocks Drop But Slightly

Few Leaders in Plus Column as Trading Lowest in Month

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—The lightest kind of selling lowered stock market trends Friday without touching off much real weakness.

An attempted recovery shift at the start soon faded. Losses, ranging from fractions to more than 2 points at the worst, were substantially reduced in the final hour but few leaders were able to finish in plus territory.

Transfers of 220,220 shares were the smallest since May 18. They compared with 281,910 Thursday. American Telephone, down 2 1/2 at one time on the revival of dividend apprehension due to reductions in disbursements by the company's subsidiaries, cut the decline to 1 1/2 at 114 1/2.

Off a point or so were Liggett & Myers "B," Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Deere and J. I. Case.

Lesser set-backs were registered for Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Western Union, Santa Fe, Great Northern, Standard Oil (NJ), Anaconda, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Du Pont, Philip Morris and Douglas Aircraft.

Minor advances were held by Johns-Manville, Southern Pacific, Southern Railway and Boeing.

Wheat Rally Try Bailed

CHICAGO, June 12 (AP)—The wheat market's renewed attempt to rally after Thursday's late slump was balked Friday by persistent weakness of feeding grains, particularly corn.

Wheat was up as much as 1/2 cent at one time, due principally to sporadic buying attributed to mills and professional dealers covering previous short sales. Corn, however, never got above Thursday's close and showed losses of almost a cent at one time.

Traders said selling of feeding grains may have been inspired at least partly by Washington reports indicating the administration would press for congressional approval of its plans to sell surplus wheat for feed.

Off 1/2 cent late in the day in sympathy with corn, wheat nevertheless managed to close unchanged to only 1/4 lower compared with Thursday, July 1.18 1/2, September 1.21 1/4-1/2.

Hop Market Stays Firm

Prices Are Unchanged At Seasonal Highs; Few Contracts

A continued steady to firm tone was maintained in Pacific coast hop markets during the week ended June 10, according to the department of agriculture. Trading continued rather slow since producers and the trade generally were awaiting further developments in the condition of the new crop, particularly in Oregon. Prices quoted growers held at around the high points for the season to date, but offerings were still only moderate to light. The reported removal of hops from the price ceiling order resulted in some improvement in the demand from domestic dealers and industries but small offerings tended to hold trading and movement to only light amounts. The unfavorable weather conditions in Oregon and Washington during recent weeks has resulted in considerable apprehension regarding the crop outputs in those states. Dry warm weather is urgently needed very soon if near normal yields are to be obtained.

Oregon hop markets remained firm with prices holding about unchanged at the seasonal high points. A few contract deals were reported completed during the past week covering around 500 bales of 1942 crop regular seeded types at 40 cents per pound net to growers, and this price was considered the going market as the period ended. Growers, however, were not inclined to offer freely at this time pending further crop and market developments. There have been no trans-

Produce Mart Prices

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—Strawberry trading was active on the farmers' wholesale market Friday with the bulk of good stock moving from \$1.30 to \$1.40 crate.

Raspberries fell off a fraction to \$1.50 for 12s in limited offering. Gooseberries were 5 cents pound.

Lettuce spread from 75 cents to \$1.25 crate with bulk of the supply moving at \$1.00. Liberal offerings of cabbage depressed prices slightly, the range being from \$2.00 to \$2.25 crate.

Local peas brought from 7 to 8 cents pound. Bing cherries sold at 12 cents pound and tartarins from 8 cents down.

Beets ranged from 50 to 60 cents dozen bunches, turnips from 70 to 80 cents, radishes from 25 to 30 cents, green onions to 35 cents. Asparagus was \$2.75 to \$3.00 pyramid, cauliflower down to \$1.00 for 1s, spinach 80 to 90 cents orange box.

Actions in seedless qualities in Oregon for some time, with the last reported sales of this type at about 47 cents per pound to growers, with discounts for seed content in excess of 2 per cent.

Condition of the growing crop in Oregon is generally regarded as extremely serious. Spread of downy mildew infestation has been rapid during the unfavorable weather of recent weeks. Trade advisers indicate that surveys of the crop during the past week show considerable loss already sustained from mildew. The infestation has spread rapidly in spite of repeated dusting operations by growers. The damage cannot be estimated at this time but the outcome of the crop will be unusually dependent upon weather developments during the coming few weeks.
