Stocks Show **Poor Response**

Gains, Losses Divide **Evenly in Timidity** Over War News

NEW YORK, June 30-(A)-The war news seemed a trifle better Tuesday but stocks were not particularly responsive and leaders generally shifted over an irreg-

Price hesitancy prevailed at the opening and, with dealings reverting to sluggishness, closing trends were spotty. While there were scattered gains of 1 to 3 points in a few sales, declines of about as much were in evidence.

The desire to await the outcome of the battle crisis in Egypt tended to halt some potential buyers, brokers said, and the tax question remained as a market problem. Some timid buying developed of the idea that the seasonal direction of industrials has been upward in 30 of the past 45 years in July.

The majority of the buoyant rails of Monday failed to repeat their climb though Santa Fe jumped 1% points when directors voted a dividend of \$1.50 on the common against \$1 paid in the preceding four quarters.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 35.3. For the month just ended the composite was up .7 of a point. Transfers totalled 248,480 shares compared with 262,293 Monday.

Phone Calls May Be Cut

WASHINGTON, June 30-(AP) The government may have to impose priorities on telephone calls, particularly long distance ones, it was hinted Monday.

Chairman James L. Fly of the communications commission told a press conference long distance calls had increased more than 50 per cent in the last 18 months and unless telephone use was cut down voluntarily there might be no escape from "undesirable alternatives."

Although he said he hesitated to speculate, he mentioned as possible steps to ease the burden on telephone lines: banning certain classes of business, shifting some types of business to certain hours, or a sytem of priorities.

Grain Prices Rise Sharply

CHICAGO, June 30.-(AP)-All grain prices advanced sharply Tuesday on buying stimulated by mill demand for flour and covering by previous short sellers. The close was at the day's top in many

Liquidation in July contracts, which had helped to unsettle the market in recent sessions, was met by good demand from elevator interests today, a fact which served to stimulate buying. The market was also considered in a favorable technical position for a rally in view of recent declines. Wheat closed 1 to 1% higher,

Large eastern bakers were reportedly active in the flour market Monday and Tuesday. Purchases yesterday totaled 100,000 barrels and an additional 50,000 to 75,000 barrels was bought Tuesday. This included both Buying prices for No. 1 stock, based spring and hard winter wheat flour, with some for nearby delivery and the balance for as far ahead as 120 days.

Primary receipts of wheat at 12 principal interior markets showed considerable pickup over last week, although remaining below the year ago level. Receipts Tuesday were 1,815,000 bushels against 821,000 a week ago and 3,088,000 a year ago.
