WOODBURN—The need for cherry and cane berries pickers is very great in the Woodburn vicinity, according to orders placed at the employment office here, at least 200 berry pickers will be needed by the end of the week and a third of them are needed now. Cherries are ready to be picked and at least 175 pickers will be required.

Many growers are providing transportation from the employment office to the fields and return. Those who can assist are asked to contact the employment office at 164 Hayes street, Woodburn.

The office is busy sending out cards to those who have signified that they would be available for work.

There is considerable call for men in hay fields, bean fields, pea vines and beet fields at hourly wages. The need for workers becomes more urgent with the warm summer weather coming on.
