Add honey, cream, vanilla, mace, eggs and rind. Beat 2 minutes. Lightly add rest of ingredients. Drop portions onto greased baking sheet. Flatten and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.

A grocer down the street tells us that apricots are going to be in market in canning quantities next week, and admonished us to pass on to our readers that the time for canning them is at hand. Check with your own grocer, and determine when he will have them at their best, then buy and can.

Fruit for Canning Ready

APRICOT CANNING Wipe the fruit with a damp cloth, to remove fuzz, peel if desired, blanch, halve and pit. Pack in jars, cover with boiling syrup and process 20 minutes in actually boiling water or for 35 minutes at 275 degrees in the oven. The hot water bath is the recommended method. All berries, except strawberries, are canned by the same method.

BERRY CANNING

Pack washed berries in jars and cover with boiling syrup, process for 20 minutes in hot water bath or 35 minutes in oven. If preferred bring fruit to a boil in the syrup, pack in jars and process in hot water bath for 5 minutes.

CHERRIES Cherries are handled the same as berries, cooking 20 minutes in hot water bath when packed cold, or 5 minutes after bringing to a boil in syrup and then packing in jars hot.

PLUMS Wash, prick skins and cover with boiling syrup. Process for 20 minutes or if brought to a boil and packed not in jars, process for 5 minutes only. They will take 45 minutes in the oven set at 275 degrees.

As to peaches, they are going to be in the market in large quantities mighty soon now, so better check up on methods you want, and how many peaches you plan to put down.

The clingstones are in now, and some people think they are excellent to can. The flavor is very good, but there's the problem of getting them off the seed. Other varieties will come along later.

FEACHES Blanch, dip in cold water and skin, pack in jars and cover with boiling syrup, cook 20 minutes in hot water bath. Every year someone pops up with the idea that you can put down peaches with the skin on, just as for apricots, and the color and flavor is grand. We've done some like that for the last 15 years and think it's a smart idea, try a few jars sometime.

Cooking loosens the skins so they are easy to remove as the fruit is eaten, the color is pretty and the flavor is grand.

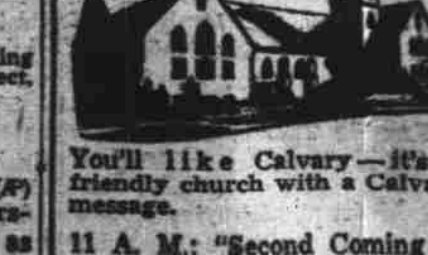
