Married Teachers Return to School

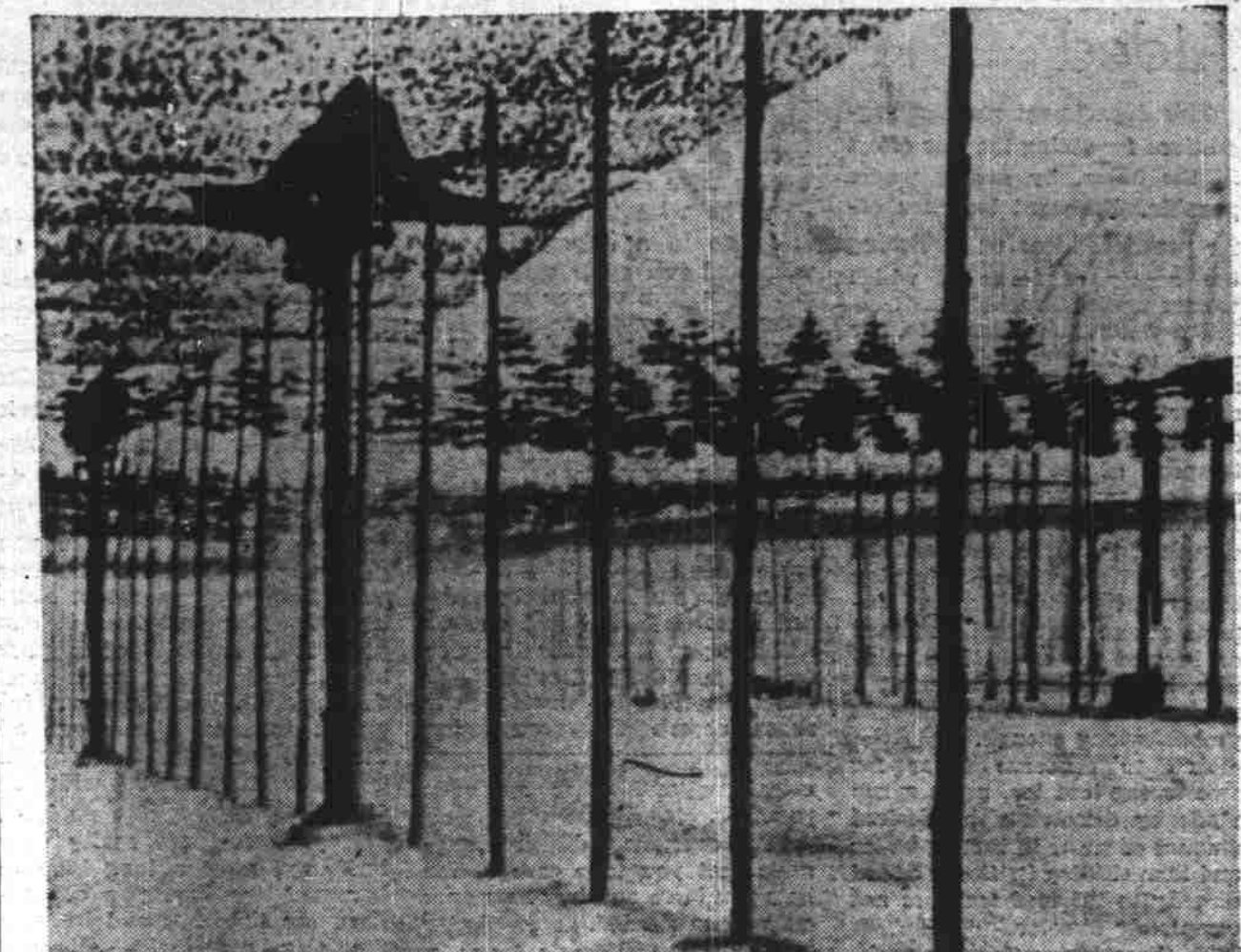
PORTLAND, July 20—(P)—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam predicted Monday that married teachers will return to Oregon schools this fall to meet a shortage of instructors. The shortage is most serious in rural schools, but not critical, he said, warning that prejudice against married teachers is a luxury few districts can afford. Putnam said the population trend away from rural areas to industrial centers might make it possible to close some small schools without hardship and transfer those teachers to other schools where they will be needed.

Private Fliers Sought for Navy Trainers

Opportunities are open for private aviators to receive commissions in the United States navy and to serve their country as instructors in the navy's great air centers, an announcement from the naval aviation cadet selection board for the 13th naval district, discloses.

The navy will train 30,000 pilots a year and the stupendous task requires a large force of competent instructors. Civilian pilot training instructors, commercial aviators and men who are active as private fliers are eligible for consideration in the navy's program to increase its corps of competent instructors. Men between the ages of 21 and 40 years are sought, and those who have the general qualifications and are able to meet the physical requirements will be chosen in the near future.

Those who lack the necessary 300 hours of pilot time with 100 hours in the last year, but qualify otherwise, will have an opportunity to meet the navy regulations through the advanced course of civilian pilot training. Their board, room and tuition will be furnished during their advanced training.

Those qualifying will be commissioned as US naval reserve flying officers, receive the full flight pay of their rank and receive additional training at great naval air stations.
