- 1 cup cooked fish
 - 1 cup cooked corn
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 2 beaten eggs or 3 yolks
 - 3 tablespoons butter, melted
 - 1 cup canned cream of mushroom soup
- Mix ingredients and pour into buttered baking dish. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven.

For a different filling in keeping with fall menu planning, halves of fresh blue plums substitute deliciously for the prunes. Dried apricots simmered gently for a few minutes in a bit of water are also colorful occupants of the center spot in these scone rounds. Fresh peaches are good.

FRUIT TREATS

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour

- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 to 4 tablespoons shortening
- 1/2 cup milk (about)
- 1 tablespoon honey or light corn syrup
- 2 eggs
- Cinnamon Sugar
- 12 cooked, pitted prunes or peaches

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut or rub in shortening. Beat 1 whole egg and 1 egg yolk, reserving white for tops. Add milk and honey to beaten eggs and add all to flour mixture. Stir only enough to make dough hold together. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead a half minute. Roll out 1/2 inch thick, and cut with doughnut cutter. Place on baking sheet. Place a peach or prune in the "hole" of each biscuit. Brush with egg white and sprinkle biscuits with Cinnamon Sugar. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 degrees) 12-15 minutes. The "holes" may be used for rolls or brushed with egg white and sprinkled with Cinnamon Sugar.

Yield: About 12 scones.

- Cinnamon Sugar
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- Mix sugar and cinnamon together

Recipes for Variety Given

Here's a miscellany of recipes, picked up from many fine sounding ones that come to the writer's desk each week. Dandy for the woman who likes no experiment with new dishes.

MALLOW PEACHES

- 6 halves peaches
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1/4 teaspoon mace
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 6 marshmallows
- Place peaches in shallow pan, spread with butter mixed with mace and salt. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Fit marshmallows in holes in peaches and bake until well puffed and brown. Serve warm with cream.

CANADIAN TORTE

- 1 1/2 cups cake flour
 - 3 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 3 egg yolks, beaten
 - 1 teaspoon lemon extract
 - 3 tablespoons butter, melted
 - 1/2 cup milk
- Mix ingredients and beat one minute. Pour into shallow pan lined with heavy waxed paper. Cover with topper.

TOPPER

- 3 eggs whites, beaten
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup drained crushed pineapple
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Beat whites until stiff. Add sugar slowly and beat until very creamy. Fold in pineapple and spread over cake batter. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake 35 minutes in moderately slow oven (325).

PEANUT BRAN MUFFINS

- 1 1/2 cups bran
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 3 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/2 cup broken or chopped salted peanuts
 - 1 1/2 cups sour milk or buttermilk
 - 3 tablespoons fat
- Mix ingredients just enough to hold them together. Half-fill

muffin pans and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm or cold.

- SPARERIBS BARBECUED
 - 4 pounds spareribs
 - 3 tablespoons salad oil
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped onions
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped green peppers
 - 1/2 cup vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 - 2 tablespoons brown sugar, honey or molasses
 - 1/2 cup chili sauce
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- Place ribs in shallow pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Simmer rest of ingredients 10 minutes. Pour over ribs and bake an hour. Baste several times.

State Arrests In July Told

State police arrested 47 persons for drunken driving during July, with fines exceeding \$2600, Charles P. Pray, superintendent of the state police department, reported to Gov. Charles A. Sprague Thursday. There were 38 arrests for reckless driving.

Arrests in the motor vehicle division totaled 1646 for the month with fines of \$9877. There were 313 arrests in the law enforcement division, 73 arrests in the game code division, and 14 arrests in the commercial fisheries code division.

The state police investigated 349 complaints with 215 classified as cleared. Approximately 127 accidents were investigated.

Four persons arrested by the state police were held for other law enforcement agencies.
