### UCC Hearings On Operating Season Start

Hearings on 125 disputed re-determinations of operating seasons from 1938 to 1941 have been launched by the state unemployment compensation commission, officials announced here Thursday.

Of these protests, 16 were filed by employers and the remainder by employees. Hearings, scheduled first in Corvallis, Oregon City and Dallas, will be held in 27 of Oregon's 36 counties during the next four months.

Payments of \$40,790 already have been made to seasonal claimants directly affected by the Layman supreme court decision. Payments in uncontested cases are being resumed, but many checks will be held up for several months until after the hearings have been completed and final re-determinations made.

Of the 649 concerns whose 1938-41 operating seasons were changed as a result of the Layman decision, 386 were found non-seasonal and the remainder were given shorter off-seasons. Back benefits are being paid only to those workers who filed and continued unemployment claims during the periods for which seasonal restrictions have been removed.

**Increases Slated In Ceilings on Dried Fruits**  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Forthcoming increases in the price ceilings on dried prunes, peaches, apricots, figs and raisins were announced Wednesday by the office of price administration.

A regulation to be issued soon will raise the March, 1942, price ceiling, at the packer level, by about 15 per cent. Another regulation will permit wholesale and retail distributors to adjust prices in relation to the packer prices. The action is designed to allow processors specified margins over the support-buying prices to growers, set previously by the agriculture department, the OPA said, adding that "it is expected to provide another link in the coordinated program to encourage maximum production and distribution."

The major portion of the dried fruit and raisin pack, which last year totaled 500,000 tons, with a \$75,000,000 sales value, will be taken this season by the military forces and lend-lease.

Sales to the domestic trade may be made only after the military and lend-lease requirements have been filled.

### Record Mark For Payroll Set, Oregon

Record mark for all time was set by Oregon's industrial payroll during the fiscal year which ended July 1, the state industrial accident commission revealed Thursday. Totalling \$265,967,190, it topped by approximately \$80,000,000 the \$186,054,225 payroll for the year which ended July 1, 1941, and by more than \$100,000,000 that of \$164,176,340 for that which closed July 1, 1940.

Multnomah county's payroll was 49.72 per cent of the state total, followed by Marion with 6.89 per cent, Lane with 6.07 per cent, and Klamath with 3.55 per cent.

The state's payroll in July, not included in the total, was \$29,101,892, a gain of almost \$10,000,000 over July, 1941. Multnomah county's payroll during the month was \$15,769,035, double the July, 1941, figure.

Marion county's industrial payroll the past year was \$18,329,333.
