Dallas Opens Service Club

Thursday Evening Will Mark Opening; Camp Adair Men Guests

An open house and inspection of the Dallas Service Men's club will be held Thursday, September 3, from 7 to 8 p. m. The program will be held at the entrance of the armory and will begin at 8 o'clock.

Mayor Leif S. Finseth will present the club to Col. Gordon H. McCoy who will officially accept it on behalf of the men of Camp Adair.

All residents of Dallas and vicinity are invited to attend and all interested are invited.

The club, which is for the entertainment of the Camp Adair boys as well as all other men visiting here in any branch of the service, is to be operated as a community project. Funds to keep it going are to be raised locally.

Oregon Is Free Of Pear Psylla

Oregon is entirely free from pear psylla, scouts who have made a thorough survey of the pear growing section in which the infestation was found on six trees near Milton just a year ago have reported to Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry of the state department of agriculture.

A hundred per cent inspection of pear trees was made in the Milton-Freewater area and the survey carried from there west to Portland. No indication of the psylla infestation was found. Pear psylla appeared a few years ago in Spokane county, Wash.

The survey just completed was made by Inspectors Downing and Newhall of the federal bureau of entomology and plant quarantine. Prompt action was taken in roguing and burning the trees on which the infestation was found in 1941.

McKennon said also that effective September 5 a new standard container for pears will be in use in this state. The new lug is 4, 4 1/4, 4 1/2, 4 3/4 or 5 inches deep, 1 1/2 inches wide and 16 1/2 inches long, all inside measurements. This is the same lug that is already in use for peaches, but is now made official for pears also.
