The list inclined to ignore cloudier war news from Egypt and Russia just as it did more favorable battle bulletins Monday. Buyers still stepped carefully pending clarification of existing tax confusion and disclosure of the president's program for stemming the high cost of living.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 36.7. Of 605 individual issues traded, 225 were down, 170 up and 210 unchanged. Transfers totalled 291,320 shares against 247,380 the day before.

Among favorites Postal Telegraph preferred made a new top with a gain of % at 1914 and Western Union was up 1/2 at 263/4 as merger talk became a bit louder. Consolation coal turned relatively active with the gain of a point. The approach of fuel oil rationing was a factor here.


