NEW YORK, Sept. 5-(A')-The stock market Saturday finished a narrowly irregular week with scattered rails and specialties registering moderate progress while many leaders continued at a

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .1 of a point at 36.9 and on the week showed a net gain of as much. Transfers totalled 145,270 shares compared with 137,940 a week ago. Lowpriced stocks accounted for most of the activity.

Profit taking in Western Union and Postal Telegraph preferred, which made new highs Friday on further talk of merger legislation, stalled their advance but both closed unchanged. Armour of Illineis prior preferred and Wilson & Co. preferred, weak spots Friday, recovered 1 and 2 points, respectively.

RAF Loses 378 Planes

LONDON, Saturday, Sept. 5(P) The RAF lost 378 planes during August in operations over Ger-many and occupied Europe, de-fense of the middle east and attacks on axis shipping, compar-ed with 247 axis planes destroyed in the same period, the air min-istry disclosed Saturday.

The report said weather conditions over Britain and German target areas generally was un-favorable but that the bomber command was over Germany on 12 nights and over both Germany and nazi-held territory five days during the month.




