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Extension of Hunting Season Not Likely Says Van Winkle

In case the present ban on hunting continues until the dates that seasons ordinarily would close Oregon hunters will be deprived of their annual sport during the 1942 season, under an opinion of Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle here Friday. Van Winkle held that the state game commission has no legal authority to extend the hunting season.

The deer season will last until October 31, but if the ban continues until that time, there will be no deer hunting. The game commission indicated that it wanted to extend the season, but Van Winkle ruled that a 1925 law deprived the commission of its authority to open a closed season.

Hunting was banned by the commission because of the serious fire hazard. It was indicated that the ban would be lifted in time for the opening of the elk and bird seasons later this month.

Officials, conferring after receipt of the attorney general's opinion, announced that while conditions had so changed in part of northwestern Oregon and the Willamette valley that hunting might be permitted, it would be unwise to rescind the closing order until conditions over the entire state are more favorable.

Attending the conference were Gov. Charles A. Sprague, Neil Rogers, state forester, and E. W. Wilson, Corvallis, chairman of the state game commission.

Wilson was told that reports on conditions being received daily from the various state forest regions and 12 national forest regions and these reports indicate that the critical season has passed he will be notified immediately. Wilson will then call members of the game commission together for a general opening of the hunting season.

Whether the charge of one month's rent for securing and drawing leases on rental property is the reasonable commission, questioned at Friday's meeting of the Salem Realty board, is a matter to be investigated by the commissions and fees committee of the organization, members voted.
