Dimout Driving Reckless—A driver who operates a motor vehicle in a dimout area in violation of the dimout regulations promulgated by the western defense command, under dates of August 2 and October 10, may be guilty of reckless driving. Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle ruled here Tuesday. VanWinkle said the statute defining reckless driving is flexible in its operation and would include any act involving the operation of a motor vehicle which is in wanton disregard of the safety of others or the property of another. The opinion was requested by District Attorney Miller D. Hayden of Marion county.

Home Evictions Restricted in Control Areas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—(AP)—Declaring that the war program was being seriously affected by evictions, Price Administrator Leon Henderson Tuesday restricted the removal of tenants from dwellings which have been sold in cities where rent control is enforced.

The restrictions will go into effect Tuesday in the 190 existing rent control areas and November 1 in 97 additional areas where rent control start then. The eviction rules may be extended to the entire country December 5.

Henderson explained that the principal device of some landlords in attempting to evade rent control had been to force the tenant to buy the house or to sell it to someone else willing to pay monthly installments in excess of the legal rent.

To combat what Henderson called phony sales, he ordered that no one in a rent control area could be evicted, except under special circumstances, without three months notice. Henderson also required that if anyone besides the tenant buys an occupied house, he cannot get possession until he has paid one-third of the purchase price, not counting any borrowed money.

Good Meat Care Urged Hunters

CORVALLIS, Oct. 20—(AP)—Oregon big-game hunters were urged Tuesday to have their sport and eat it too.

"Don't waste meat by improper handling; make every pound count in the wartime meat supply," said Lucy Case and H. A. Lindgren, Oregon State college extension specialists.

Hunters should be prepared to dress animals in the woods, they said.

Jackson Heads Prize Group For Salvage

Appointment of P. L. Jackson, Portland newspaper publisher, as chairman of the prize awards committee, in connection with the newspaper scrap metals drive, was announced here Tuesday by Claude I. Sersanous, head of the state salvage committee.

Other members of the committee are Judge Carl W. Chambers, president of the Oregon Counties association; Martin W. Hawkins, presiding judge of the Multnomah county circuit court; Donald Erb, president of the University of Oregon; and W. J. Schoenfeld, dean of the school of agriculture, Oregon State college.

Prize awards to be made by the state salvage committee include: Bond of \$1000, present value, to the county that collected the largest per capita poundage for any three weeks between September 28 and October 24. Bond of \$500, present value, to the Oregon county with the next highest per capita average. These prizes will go to charities.

Bond of \$300, present value, to the business concern which gives or sells the largest amount of scrap metal.

Bond of \$150, present value, to the individual, man, woman, boy or girl, giving or selling the largest amount of scrap metal. Bonds of stamps, \$50 present value, to the unit of a boys' or girls' organization turning in the largest amount of scrap metal.

Sersanous stressed that competitors for the awards must file certified weight certificates.

Voters Gain In Jefferson County Only

Only four counties yet to report their voters' registration figures for the November election to the secretary of state are Gilliam, Grant, Klamath and Umatilla.

Figures thus far received show that Jefferson is the only county having a larger total registration than two years ago. Two years ago Jefferson's total registration for the general election was 1178 as against 1180 this year.

Revised figures from Curry county show a total registration for the 1942 general election of 2371, as compared to 2329 in 1940. Republican registrations dropped from 1528 to 1368 and democrats from 1065 to 985. It previously was reported that Curry county's 1942 registration was larger than for the general election two years ago.

Tillamook county, reporting Tuesday, has a total registration for this year's November election of 6084 as against 6505 in 1940. Republican registrations slumped from 3737 in 1940 to 3566 in 1942, while the democratic registration dropped from 2688 to 2458.

Election officials said they hoped to have all the county registrations for the 1942 general election tabulated by the end of the current week.

Name of Astoria Asked for Ship

Gov. Charles A. Sprague, upon being advised Tuesday that Secretary of the Navy Knox had authorized the renaming of two uncompleted cruisers the Quincy and Vincennes, declared that he would ask Knox to rename a new cruiser The Astoria.

The cruisers Quincy, Vincennes and Astoria were sunk the same night in the Solomon Islands.

Governor Sprague said he felt that as long as Knox had decided on renaming new ships after the Quincy and Vincennes, he also should designate a new cruiser as the Astoria.

Sprague Talks At Willamette

The role of the liberal arts college in preserving culture while the world pauses to engage in mutual destruction, was the theme of an address by Gov. Charles A. Sprague before the Willamette university student body Tuesday.

Governor Sprague emphasized the importance of maintaining the liberal arts standards even while the young men of the nation are concentrating on the sciences in preparation for service in the armed forces. He added that many students make the mistake of merely going to college to absorb learning like a sponge, and pointed out that to get anything out of their college experience students must make a contribution to their school and organization.

It is more important than ever before that students put forth every effort to get the most out of their college life during this period when the United Nations of the world are attempting to "emancipate human kind from the threat to the finer philosophies," Governor Sprague said.

Two Sentences Are Commuted

The 20-year penitentiary sentence imposed on Farrell W. Loos, Portland, charged with forgery, Tuesday was commuted to 15 years by Gov. Charles A. Sprague. Members of the parole board advised Governor Sprague that the sentence was too severe. Loos was received at the prison here February 23, 1939.

Another commutation reduced the penitentiary sentence of M. A. Stone, also from Multnomah county, from 10 years to seven years. He was received at the prison June 3, 1939, for forgery. This commutation also was recommended by the state parole board.
