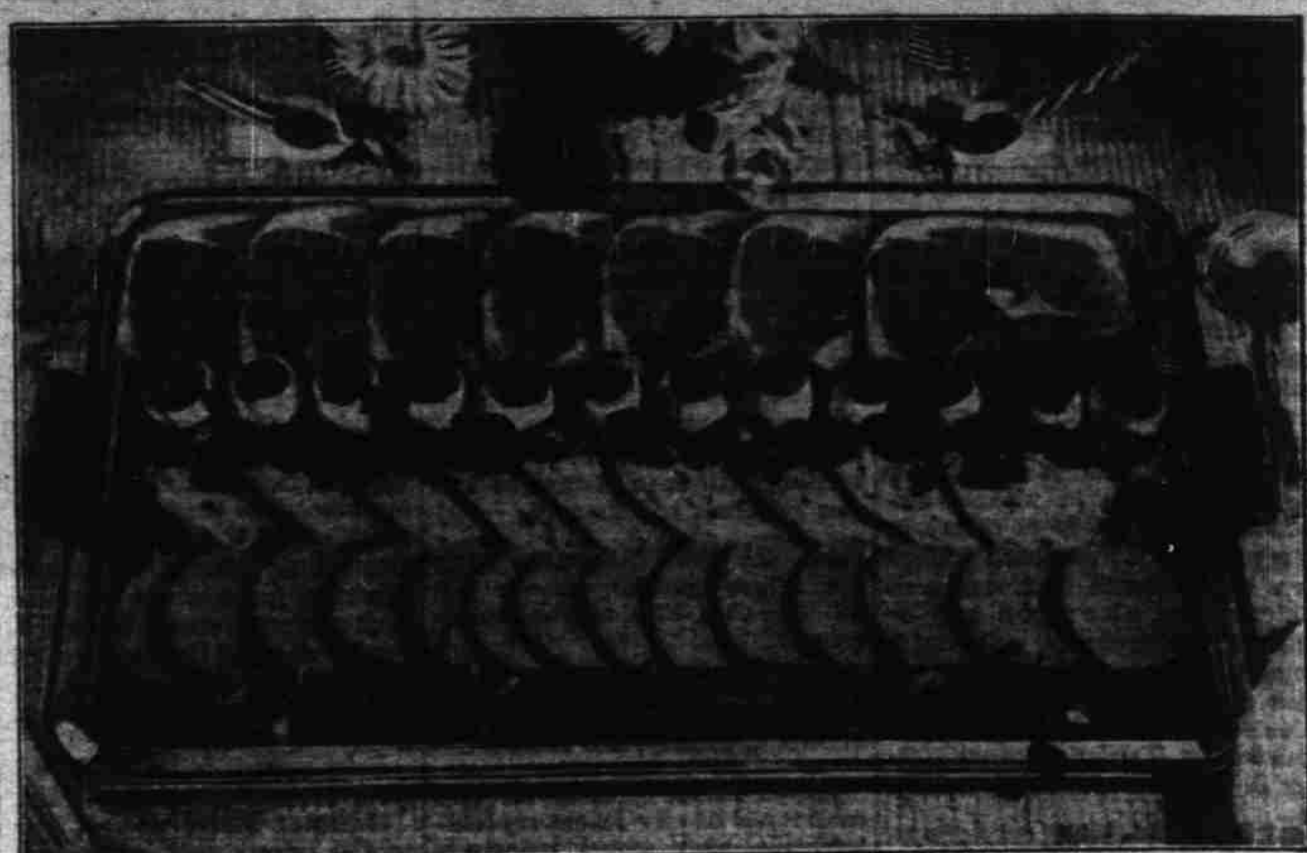

- MEAT CASSEROLE WITH BISCUITS**
- 2 cups cooked, cubed meat
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons fat
 - 2 teaspoons salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 2 cups peas and juice
 - 1/2 cup cooked, sliced carrots
 - 1/2 cup cooked lima beans
 - 2 tablespoons water

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 to 4 tablespoons shortening
- 3/4 to 1 cup milk

Brown meat and onions in hot fat. Add salt and pepper. Add peas and juice, carrots, and lima beans. Blend two extra tablespoons flour and water together to make a thick paste. Add to vegetable mixture and cook until thick. Pour into casserole. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk to form soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead a half minute. Roll dough 1/2-inch thick. Cut with 1/2-inch biscuit cutter. Place biscuits around edge on top of vegetable mixture. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 10 to 12 minutes or until biscuits are browned. Serves six.
