The applicant will find space for listing his tire serial numbers on the back of the form.

On the tire inspection record which is separated from the gas ration application form by a perforated line, the applicant again writes down his tire serial numbers, and certifies that these numbers are the same as those listed in the other part of the form.

The tire inspection record will be torn from the application form when the applicant registers. It contains space for the tire inspector to make his report following each inspection of the tires.

Four Diphtheria Cases Reported In County, Week

Four cases of diphtheria reported last week from Marion county do not represent an epidemic, and immediate sources of the disease are known, members of the county health department staff said this week. All known cases in the county have been isolated and immunization of children should not be neglected, it was declared. fused, it was said. With the current influx of population from areas where immunization is not readily available, danger of spread of diphtheria or similar diseases is greatly increased, the spokesman for the department declared, pointing out that school children may secure the treatment at Saturday morning clinics at the department offices in the Masonic building.
