City Officials Named At Tuesday Election; Return Dayton Mayor

AURORA—The newly-elected officers of the city of Aurora are G. A. Fredrikson, mayor; councilmen, George Wurster, Armen Netter, E. M. Hurst, E. W. Stoner, treasurer, Andrew Fry; recorder, George Fry.

DAYTON—Carl Francis was re-elected mayor at the Dayton city election Tuesday, without opposition. He received 108 votes. Others elected were James Wakefield, recorder, 102 votes; J. L. Sherman, treasurer, 106.

Councilmen elected were L. D. Krake, one year; Cletus Gell and W. S. U'Ren, two years.

Hold over members of the council are Harry Sherman and Paul Londershausen.

Carl Francis, mayor of Dayton, was named Yamhill county representative to the legislature.

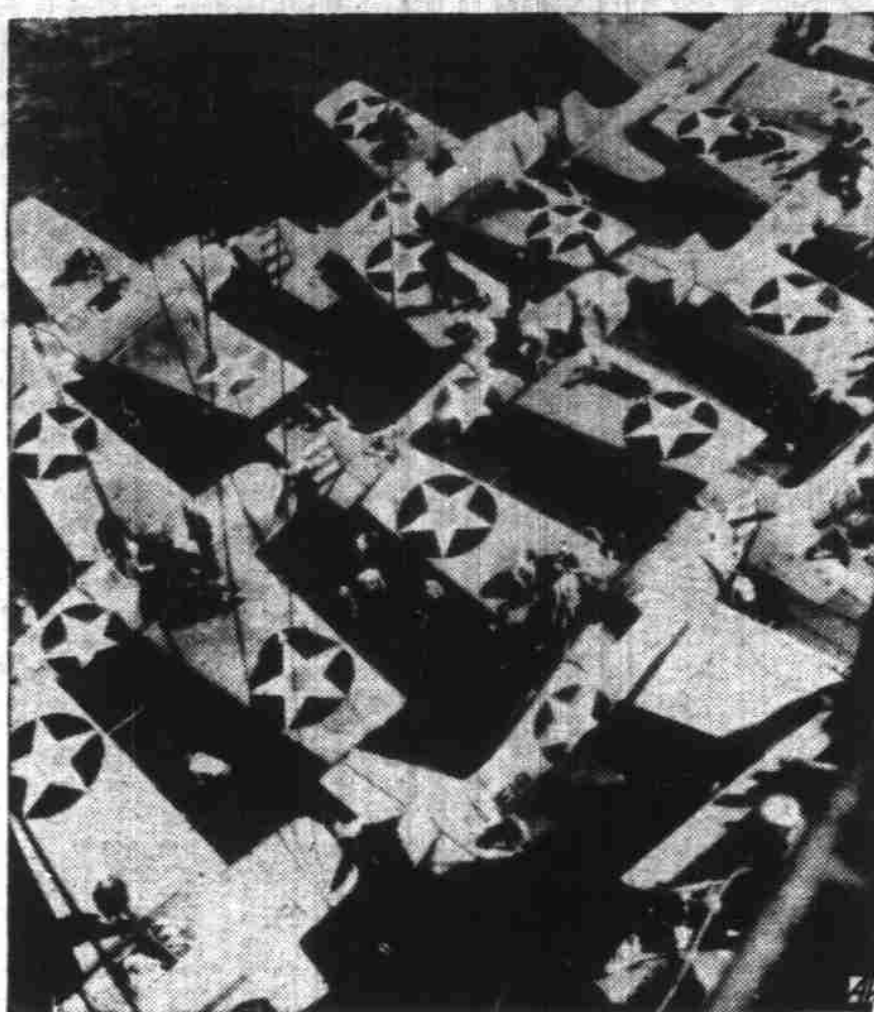

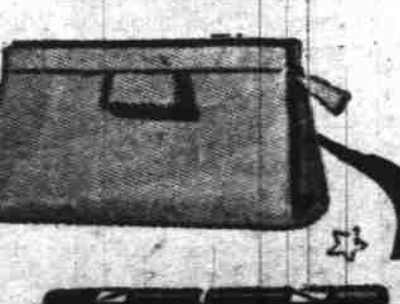
