News Reports Push Issues

Average Up .4 Point To Best in Year; Trading Grows

NEW YORK, Nov. 6-(A) Belated stock market attention was given the big Axis rout in Egypt Friday and leading issues, notably those that might benefit from a quicker than expected peace, rose fractions to 2 or more points, many to peaks for a year or longer.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .4 of a point at 40.6, a new top since November 5, last year. Transfers of 856,830 shares compared with 598,360 Thursday, and were the best since October 13.

International Telephone, an outstanding stock in the peace category, was the liveliest mover of the proceedings, advancing % of a point to 5%, best mark for the year to date. Others in the new high division included General Motors, up 1 at 421/4; American Locomotive preferred, up 7% at 91: Johns-Manville, up 21/4 at 65%, and Sears Roebuck, up 34 at 59.

Talk of the priorities for railroads badly in need of new equipment spurred the American Locomotive stocks. The common advanced a point.

Well ahead were U. S. Steel Bethlehem, American Telephone Chrysler, Yellow Truck, Youngs town Sheet, Crucible Steel, Stand ard Oil (N.J.), Texas Co., Ameri can Airlines, Du Pont, American Can, Woolworth, Owens-Illinois U.S. Gypsum, Homestake Minin International Harvester, Mon gomery Ward, Kennecott, Goo rich, Dow Chemical, Westin house and Eastman Kodak.

On the losing end were San Fe, Pennsylvania, Great Nort ern, Canadian Pacific, Dougl Aircraft and Sperry.

It was what brokers term "broad" market. Of 846 issu traded, 491 were up, 164 dov and 191 unchanged.




















