

Selling Puts Stocks Down

Good News Provokes Lighter Loads; Average Off 4

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—As has happened many times before, the stock market Tuesday sold off on good news.

The US naval victory in the Solomons was virtually ignored as a buying incentive and, while Wall Street was elated over south Pacific developments, there was an inclination to lighten commitments on the idea that the latest turn of events may have been pretty well discounted on the September-October-November bulge to highest marks for more than a year.

Fractional advances are well distributed at the start. These were soon eliminated in many cases although volume was small. The reaction gained headway in the final hour and declines ran to a point or so for recent favorites, with drops of 2 to 3 in isolated instances.

Tax selling still was a retarding factor and some potential buyers apparently held aloof on the idea that this sort of liquidation might expand and enable them to pick up desired issues at lower levels.

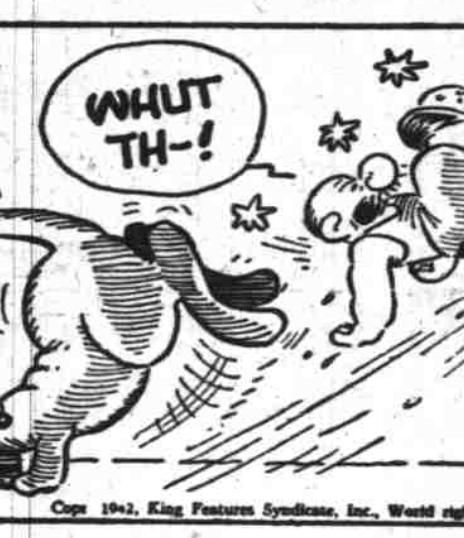

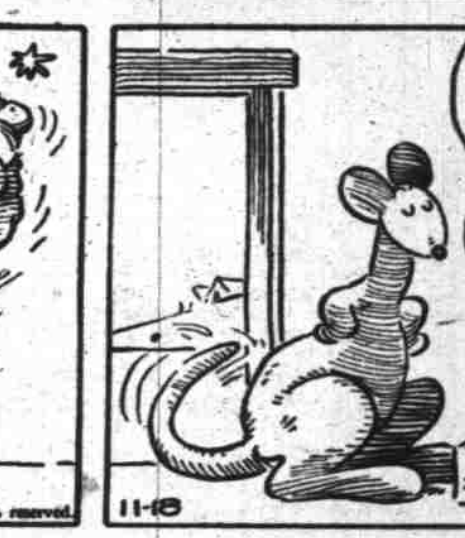

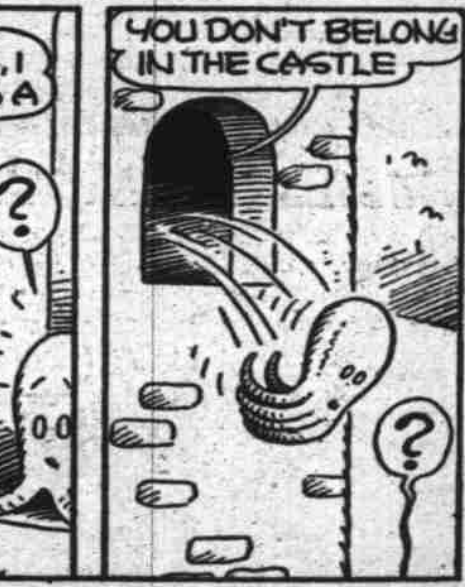
