

Stocks Show First Gains

Recovery Tried With Rails, Industrials Leading Trend

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—(AP)—The stock market took on a recovery tinge Friday for the first session this week and favored rails and industrials rose fractions to a point or more, a handful to new highs for the year.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 3 of a point at 46.1, the first upturn since last Saturday. Transfers of 658,980 shares compared with 502,592 the day before.

New 1942 peaks were touched by Dome Mines, Pepsi-Cola, Gillette and Hecker products, among others.

Santa Fe jumped nearly 2 on another dividend declaration but cut this to 1/2 at the finish. Texas & Pacific Railway, on the other hand, dropped 1 1/2, apparently because of some disappointment over yesterday's late declaration of \$1 on the common.

Retaining improvement were NY Central, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, US Steel, Bethlehem, American Telephone, International Telephone, Western Union, General Motors, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, Anaconda, Standard Oils of Indiana and California, Du Pont, General Electric, Allied Chemical, Loew's, Pan American Air Ways, Commercial Investment trust and Warner Bros.

Scattered losers included Johns-Manville, Southern Railway, Woolworth, Sperry, Philip Morris and J. C. Penney.

Contributing to improved sentiment was the quick disposal of a "special" 16,000-share block of Allis-Chalmers at 25 1/2.

Cereal Prices Add Fractions

CHICAGO, Nov. 20—(AP)—Continuing the grain market's feeble recovery, cereal futures prices Friday added fractions ranging up to 1/8.

Wheat was in the lead, reflecting small scale orders attributed to mills largely as a result of routine flour business. Trade in all grains remained restricted, however, due to uncertainty regarding government price control policies.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 cent higher than Thursday, December \$1.25-1.24 1/2, May \$1.28 1/2.

Cannery Ends Work on Pears

WOODBURN—The Ray-Maling cannery completed its 1942 run on pears on Saturday, November 14. The run lasted 74 days.

Carl Huber, the plant superintendent, indicated that a small crew was still working on carrots and the last canning would be in about two weeks after which no more canning would be done until next spring. The large Ray-Maling warehouse is stacked full of canned goods and in addition several empty store buildings in Woodburn's business section have been rented and filled with canned goods. A large part of this pack of fruit and vegetables has already been sold, most of it to the armed forces.

Market for 1940 Hops Is Active

PORTLAND, Nov. 20—(AP)—Hop trade reports of the department of agriculture indicated Friday that 1940 hops will be purchased as fast as they become available to Oregon markets. Dealers have bid 60-65 cents per pound for them subject to certification.

Practically all 1942 hops have been sold and growers are reluctant to contract for 1943 hops.
