

Peace Issues Lead Market

Prices Show General Slippage in Slow Trading Day

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—Prices generally slipped to moderately lower levels in Monday's market although scattered favorites, mainly in the peace classification, managed to make a fairly good showing.

While further cheering war news inspired light bidding for selected issues, many recent climbers settled down to a do-nothing area.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 1.1 of a point, at 39.7, and on the month was down .3. In November last year the composite was off 1.6 points.

It was recalled that the direction was downward during most of December, 1941, and, despite a strong rally at the approach of 1942, the average in the twelfth month lost 1.7 points.

Corn Advances To New High; Others Down

CHICAGO, Nov. 30 (AP)—Corn prices advanced to highs for almost two months Monday but other grain futures turned lower.

Good industrial demand for limited supplies of corn accounted for strength of that cereal. Liquidation of December contracts prior to the delivery period beginning Tuesday, profit taking and lagging flour trade pending expiration of the temporary price ceiling Thursday resulted in weakness of other grains.

Corn was up a full cent at one time, December contracts reaching a high of 85 cents, but at the close prices were only 1/4-1/2 higher than Saturday, December 84 1/4-3/4, May 89 1/2-3/4. Gains of 1/4-3/4 cent were posted in other pits early in the session but wheat closed 1/4-1/2 lower than Saturday, December 11.24 3/4, May \$1.29 1/2-3/4; oats 1/4-3/4 off; rye 1/4-1/2 lower, and soybeans 1/4-3/4 lower.

Some mill buying of wheat was reported while commercial bread consumption was said by baking trade representatives to be up 15 per cent compared with last year, due partly to rationing of some other foods.

The senate agriculture committee approved a resolution for investigation into certain phases of the government's price control and market stabilization program, including the flour ceiling.

The lecturer's hour included singing and a quiz program. It was voted to exchange inexpensive gifts at the Christmas meeting.

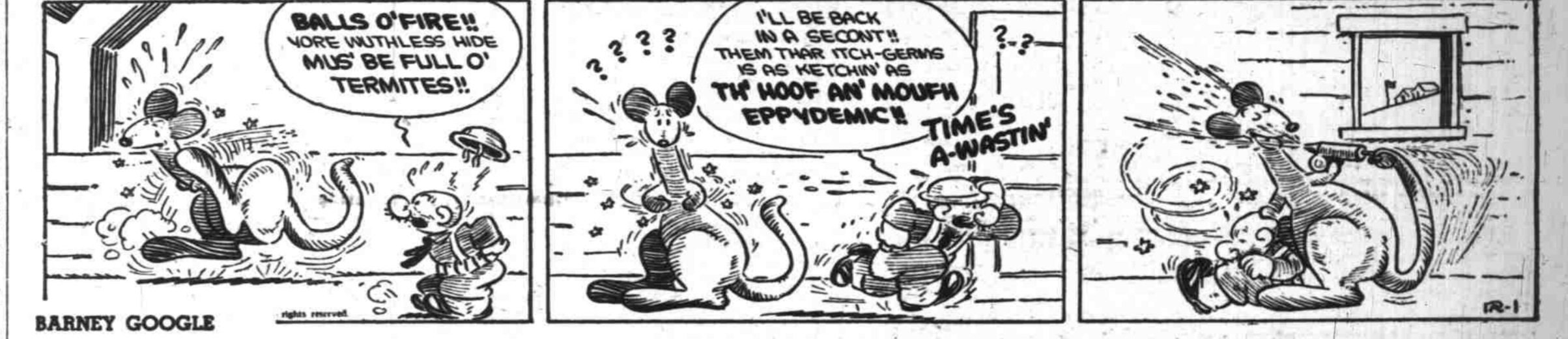
Community Clubs
