

Band and Orchestra Will Appear With Guest Soloist Tuesday

The high school band and orchestra will play in concert on Tuesday night in the auditorium of the high school. The program is set for 8 o'clock and is for the benefit of the uniform fund. Vernon Wiscarson is director. Mr. Henri Arcand is the main soloist of the evening but student musicians are featured, playing solos. In the "Rhapsody in Blue," Wayne Struble will play the clarinet solo parts and "smears." This consists of a "glissando" or sliding from the bottom of the clarinet scale to the higher notes of the octave. In the "Procession of the Sardar" the solo is played by the bassoons and flutes (Betty Zo Allen and Horace Beldin flutists, and Rosemary Gaiser and Ruth Bain bassoonists.) This melody has a very peculiar tone color because of the wide range of the high flute tones and the lower tones of the bassoons. "Them Basses" march shows the technique of the trombones, baritone and bass sections and is as the name implies features and lower brass instruments.

The Three Bears with Horace Beldin as narrator, follows the story by the same name. The small bear is imitated by the higher woodwind instruments, the middle sized bear by the medium brass instruments and the great big bear by the deep toned instruments of the band. Every section of the band is featured in this number.

"Land O' Cotton" is a medley of southern tunes—made up of "Joshua Fit De Battle Ob Jericho," "Hand Me Down My Walking Cane," and others.

Two of the majorettes are national contest winners of last year's contest, Betty Pierce, senior and Barbara Jones, sophomore. Betty Pierce is the leader.

The band elects leaders in each section and these leaders form the board of directors, which meets every two weeks to discuss band matters. This year many parties and swims are planned to take the place of trips to other towns.

This concert will be the first time that either band or orchestra has ever accompanied a soloist and also the first time that "The Rhapsody in Blue" and "Re-

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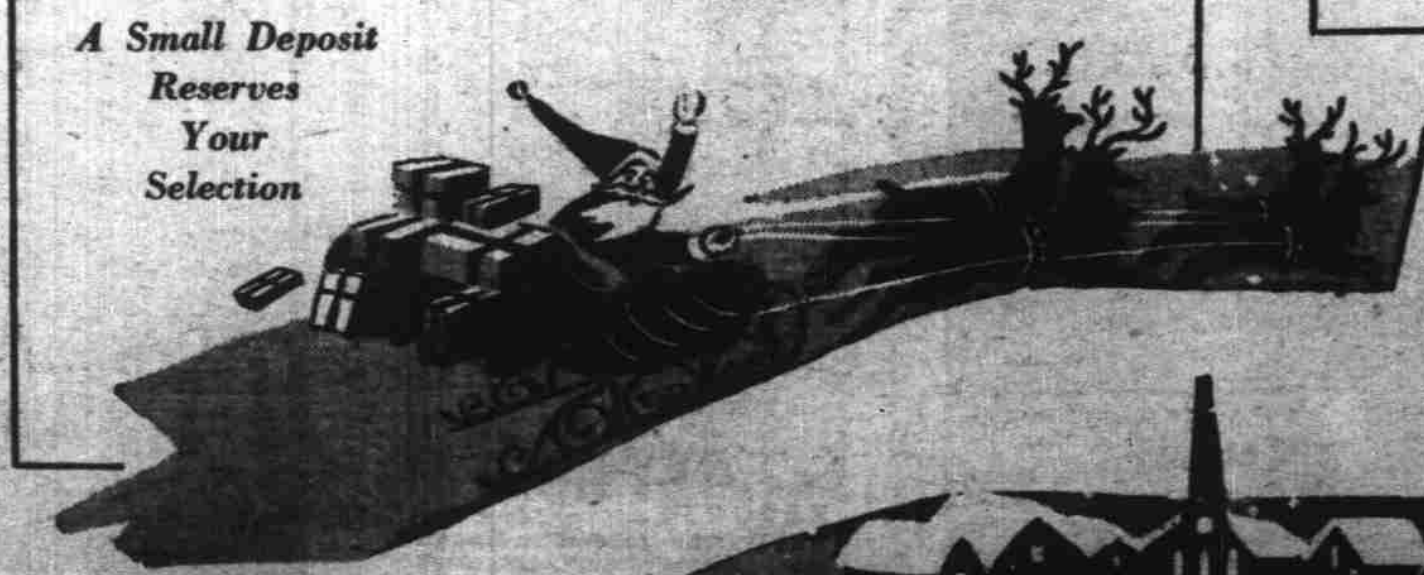
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
