Before the assembled Legionnaires and auxiliary members and their children, the Fennimores were presented with a red and white silk service flag with seven blue stars arranged in the form of a V. Commander Tony Traeger made the presentation and told briefly of the Fennimore boys' record, which is not matched by any other family west of the Minnesota.

Father Hildebrand, guardian of the service men, spoke of the sacrifice and honor of Mr. and Mrs. Fennimore. Mt. Angel now has 168 men in the service, a high ratio.

The Fennimores, who have 11 children living, eight sons and three daughters, have only one son left at home. He is married and the father of several children.

# Observation Post Clears Profit

DALLAS—With the completion of certain needed improvements at the Dallas observation post, the county coordinator, W. Blackley, has turned over to Ed C. Dunn, chief observer for the post, the money which remained in the fund collected in July when plans were made to operate the post on a paid observer basis.

The improvements effected at the post include the conversion from a tent house, which served for some seven or eight months, to a double constructed frame building, the installation of electric lights and sanitary facilities. In addition to the lumber used in building, other donations to the post include a stove from Hollis Smith, a wash basin from Lloyd Soehren and wood from the Willamette Valley Lumber company.

The post started with a balance of \$35.75 in July and reached \$369.35 by August 31. Expenditures for improvements and operating expenses totaled \$298.90, leaving the post with a credit of \$82.45.

# Truck Owners' Gas Rationing To Be Adjusted

DALLAS—Farm truck operators who have not received adequate allowances of gasoline or mileage on their certificate of war necessity for their trucks need not be alarmed as provision is being made for supplying every farm truck owner with an adequate allotment.

Word has been received by W. C. Leth, Polk county agent, that plans are being made for adjustments so that all farmers will have sufficient gasoline for their complete essential farming operations. Those whose certificates are now inadequate can receive assistance in filing appeals through the county farm transportation which has agreed to accept recommendations of such local county committees in determining the needs for farmers in that county.

Until the full procedure is known, or until the proper blanks are received, this committee will not be able to function. Farmers whose December and first quarter allowances of gasoline are insufficient for operating the next month, should contact their local rationing boards for the additional necessary gasoline.

Publicity will be given in the newspapers of the county when the Polk county farm transportation committee will be able to begin working on appeals. The county agent's office will be able to give information to anyone in this connection in the meantime. Farmers should not return their certificates for correction until proper appeal forms are filled out. It will be possible for farmers to fill out the appeal forms themselves, however those forms having the indorsement of the county transportation committee will probably be more likely to receive their full requirements, states Mr. Leth.
