STEAMED CRANBERRY NUT PUDDING

1 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda
1/4 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon mace
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup nuts (any kind)
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup molasses
2 teaspoons sugar
3 tablespoons fat, melted
Chop cranberries, add them to rest of ingredients and pour into buttered mold. (The mold should not be more than 1/2 full.) Cover and steam 2 1/2 hours. Unmold and serve warm with cream or cranberry sauce.
