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Grange Asks Lieutenant

Referendum Sought to Create Office to Bar Deadlocks

As a proposed preventive of senate deadlocks such as has prevailed at the opening of this session of the Oregon legislature, the legislative committee of the Oregon state grange announced Tuesday it would ask the legislature to refer to the voters a constitutional amendment creating the office of lieutenant-governor.

Morton Tompkins, state grange master, declared that if Oregon had a lieutenant-governor organization of the senate probably would not have been delayed. Under the existing laws the presiding officer of the senate is the governor in case the latter resigns, dies or is incapacitated.

The proposed constitutional amendment, if approved by the legislature, would go before the voters at the next special or general election. A previous attempt to create the office of lieutenant-governor in Oregon was rejected by the voters.

Members of the grange legislative committee, other than Tompkins, are Blanche H. Pickering and Clarence Carter.

Tompkins said the amendment probably would be introduced early in the session.

Lower Voting Age Proposed

The voting age in Oregon would be reduced from 21 to 18 years under a proposed constitutional amendment introduced in the house Tuesday by Rep. Vernon Bull (D-Union).

Other voting qualifications would not be changed. Bull said that in view of the recent action of the government in calling 18-year-olds into military service they should have the right to vote.

It was expected that the resolution would be referred to the house committee on elections.
