Today's Menu

Fruit salad bowl

Braised tongue
Buttered kale
Baked potatoes
Cottage pudding

BRAISED TONGUE

1 fresh tongue
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons fat, melted
2 cups tongue stock
3 tablespoons chopped onions
1/2 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard

Add salt to water and add tongue. Simmer four hours. When cool enough to handle, discard skin and muscles at the thick end of the tongue. Tie tongue in a circle and place in baking pan. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons flour and add rest of ingredients. Uncover and bake 10 minutes with drippings left in pan. Remove to serving platter. Discard cord and cut tongue into thin crossway slices (leave it in the round shape on the platter).

Eggs Appear on Dinner Menu

Eggs are nice, if you can get them. And eggs make an excellent meat substitute. Here's one idea for their use.

EGGS NEWPORT

4 eggs beaten
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon white pepper
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1 teaspoon minced parsley
1/4 teaspoon thyme or marjoram optional
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/2 cup buttered crumbs

Beat eggs and add milk, salt, pepper, celery salt, parsley and thyme. Pour into butter melted in double boiler. Cover and cook slowly 5 minutes. Stir twice with fork, add rest of ingredients and cook a minute. Serve on heated platter. Surround with buttered peas or green beans or carrots.

Mathematics Luther Topic

Relationship of mathematics to war was discussed by Dr. Chester F. Luther, dean of liberal arts at Willamette university, when he appeared Tuesday before the Salem Kiwanis club.
