It was made plain last week that moral delinquency and venereal disease do not come to the soldier in the camp but in outside towns. All those who are interested in a better community for the soldier as an aid in winning the war are urged to attend.

US to Control 77,000 Acres

The United States government, through the war department, is accepting jurisdiction over 77,000 acres of Oregon lands now embraced in five military reservations, according to notification given the state in a letter to Gov. Earl Snell.

Areas removed by the action will be Camp Adair, in Benton, Linn and Polk counties; Arlington bombing range, Morrow county; Beaver terminal and storage depot, Columbia county; Portland army air base, Multnomah county, and Camp White at Medford, Jackson county.

Election to assume full jurisdiction to the exclusion of state enforcement codes is being taken in line with congressionally approved federal policy and is made possible in Oregon under a law passed by the legislature in 1909, granting this option where title has been acquired in fee simple by the federal government. Effective date as fixed by the federal government is February 15.

Preliminaries for Fuel Oil Registration Are Outlined

Fuel oil users must have their applications already made out when they go to the specified school buildings to register on February 15, 16 and 17, school authorities who are directing actual work of ration registration pointed out Friday. No application blanks will be available at the schools, but consumers can get them from their fuel oil dealers, it was explained.

Once obtained, the blanks should be filled out carefully and legibly, City Supt. Frank B. Bennett and County Supt. Agnes C. Booth explained. At the schools they will be checked at time of registration and are not to be acceptable unless they contain the required information.

Floor space must be figured and entered in item 11 of the blank relating to the "private dwelling," form 1100. A certification showing oil purchases, signed by the oil dealer must accompany form 1101, which applies to "other than private dwelling," and such a certification should accompany form 1100, Bennett said.

Three types of blanks are available. The third, in addition to the two previously mentioned, is that for "domestic institutional and agricultural uses." One applicant may have as many types of blanks as his fuel oil uses require.

In Salem the registration is to be from 4:30 to 8:30 p. m. next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at Parrish and Leslie junior high schools.

Registrants should enter Parish by the north door on the west (front) side of the building; at Leslie they should use the main entrance. All persons living north of State street are to register at Parrish, those living south of the dividing line at Leslie.

The high school buildings in the cities where district rationing headquarters have been set up are to serve as registration points over the county outside of Salem, Mrs. Booth had announced earlier this week.

Stayton, Silverton and Woodburn high schools are to receive the fuel oil registration blanks from 3 to 6 p. m. each of the three days designated for the state. Registrants were instructed to go to the nearest center.

With the information as to floor space and oil previously used, high school mathematics pupils are to work out the practical problems entailed to figure the ration to be allotted. This work, checked by teachers, goes in turn to the rationing board.
