- BRANBERRY SHORTCAKE**  
1 1/2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup bran  
1/2 cup shortening  
3/4 cup milk  
Combine dry ingredients. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add milk all at once, stirring only until all flour is dampened. Turn out on lightly floured board and gently roll about 1/4 inch thick. Place in round greased tin and bake in hot oven (400 degrees) about 25 minutes. Split with fork and serve with crushed fresh fruit.
