

Rails Reach 3-Year Tops

Industrials Generally Higher in Broad, Heavy Session

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP)—Rail stocks continued to climb to new tops for more than three years in Thursday's market on one of the largest turnovers since late 1941. While industrials did relatively well from the start, many touching two-year peaks, these were handicapped to some extent by profit cashing on the long upswing. Even the transportations slipped a shade under the best at the close although final plus marks ranged from fractions to around two points for favorites.

The Associated Press 60-stock average ended up 1/4 of a point at 46.1, highest since November 14, 1940. It was the fourth successive advance. The rail composite was up .5 at 22, best figure since early November, 1939. The utility index also registered a new high since October 14, 1941. Transfers amounted to 1,777,290 shares against 1,691,110 the day before. It was the broadest market since last December, 961 individual issues being traded. Of these, 568 were up, 168 down and 225 unchanged.

Wheat Prices Rise to New 6-Year High

CHICAGO, Feb. 25 (AP)—Prices in the wheat pit advanced to new highs for at least the past six years, with the September contract bringing more than any delivery in over 13 years, on small but persistent mill buying Thursday.

The strength in wheat was reflected in the rye pit, where new seasonal peaks for all deliveries were recorded. Corn held at ceilings throughout the day. Oats displayed less buoyancy than other grains, apparently hampered by fear of Canadian imports when lake navigation opens.

At the close wheat was up 3/4%, May \$1.43-1.43 1/2, July \$1.43 1/2-3/4.

Buying of the bread cereal was based mainly on expectations of favorable legislative developments. Grain men believed the senate would approve the Bankhead bill, which would prevent deducting subsidies in computing parity as a basis for agricultural price ceilings. News that the bill had passed was received after the market closed.

Support was also forthcoming from a letter of Grover Hill, assistant secretary of agriculture, to William Jeffers, rubber administrator. Hill favored the expanded use of grains in the production of alcohol for synthetic rubber.

A report from Kansas said wheat acreage seeded in that state last fall was the smallest in 20 years, with indications the harvest will drop considerably below last year.

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Club Rates Shedd Bull Superior Sire

Gamboge Ashburn Baronet, 369170, a registered Jersey owned by J. M. D. & Son of Shedd has been named a superior sire by the American Jersey Cattle Club, New York. This is the highest honor and distinction that officially can be given to a Jersey sire. It signifies a production and type transmitting ability of real merit. There are, to date, 105 registered sires to be so honored.

This sire was bred by J. R. and E. L. McCracken of Ashland, born May 22, 1935. Rating is good plus, while his 12 daughters have been given an average of 89.92. Four very good, five good plus, and three good. Ten tested daughters average 11,865 pound milk, 5.83 per cent, 691 pounds fat. All records were made on twice a day milking. Among these are 8 silver medal and one gold medal awards for high production. His higher producing daughters include: Nelly Polly Ann 1160762, 615 pound fat, 10,291 pound milk 5.98 per cent test in 305 days at four years; Lula Leona of Ashburn 1202598, 565 pound fat, 9305 pound milk 6.08 per cent test 365 days as a yearling; Spozza Baronetti of Ashburn 1223303, 534.9 pound fat 9717 pound milk 5.50 per cent test 365 days at two years.

The sire of this superior sire is Sybil Ashburn Gamboge 343195. He was officially classified good plus and named a silver medal tested sire, his ten daughters having a 365 day mature equivalent average of 12,853 pounds milk 5.57 per cent 715.6 pounds fat. The dam of Gamboge Ashburn Baronet is Jean's Peggy of Myer Creek 829001. She is a Ton O'Gold cow with 2183 pound fat recorded in four successive herd test years. Her eight records are two years, 573 pound fat; three years, 638; four years, 726; five years, 646; six years, 519; seven years, 609; eight years, 534; nine years, 584. She is a marvelous illustration of regular breeding, normal calving and year in and year out high production. Her sire Lassie's Sybil's Gamboge, 267725, is a son of Mabel's Gamboge mentioned in the top half of the pedigree.

She has produced 17 times her own weight in the war precious vital food product, butterfat. The production of this Jersey cow is nearly six times greater than the average production of cows in America.
