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## Miller Tells Of Red Cross

Jefferson to Launch Membership Drive On Sunday

JEFFERSON — Fifteen women interested in the work of the Red Cross attended the Red Cross meeting Tuesday afternoon in the city hall. Floyd Miller and Mrs. Bynon of Salem, were present to explain the work of the Red Cross and assist in getting the Red Cross membership and war drive started.

J. T. Jones, local chairman of the Red Cross introduced Mr. Miller, who spoke interestingly. He told of the beginning of the Red Cross in 1859 and how it has spread into 63 countries at the present time. He stated that Sunday is Red Cross day in all the churches, and offerings will be taken for that work. The month of March has been designated as Red Cross month; and there will be no war bond drive during next month.

Miller also told of the divisions of the Red Cross, such as first aid, in which 48,000 people in Marion county had taken the course under

87 volunteer instructors; also the home nursing course, which was taken up by 560 persons; the nutrition classes, the production division and disaster division, which took care of the damage done by the flood, and assisted many soldiers. He stated that the Red Cross had taken care of 65 day rooms at Camp Adair. Many people get the idea that most of the money solicited goes for salaries, he said, but only 8 cents out of every dollar goes toward paying expenses and salaries.

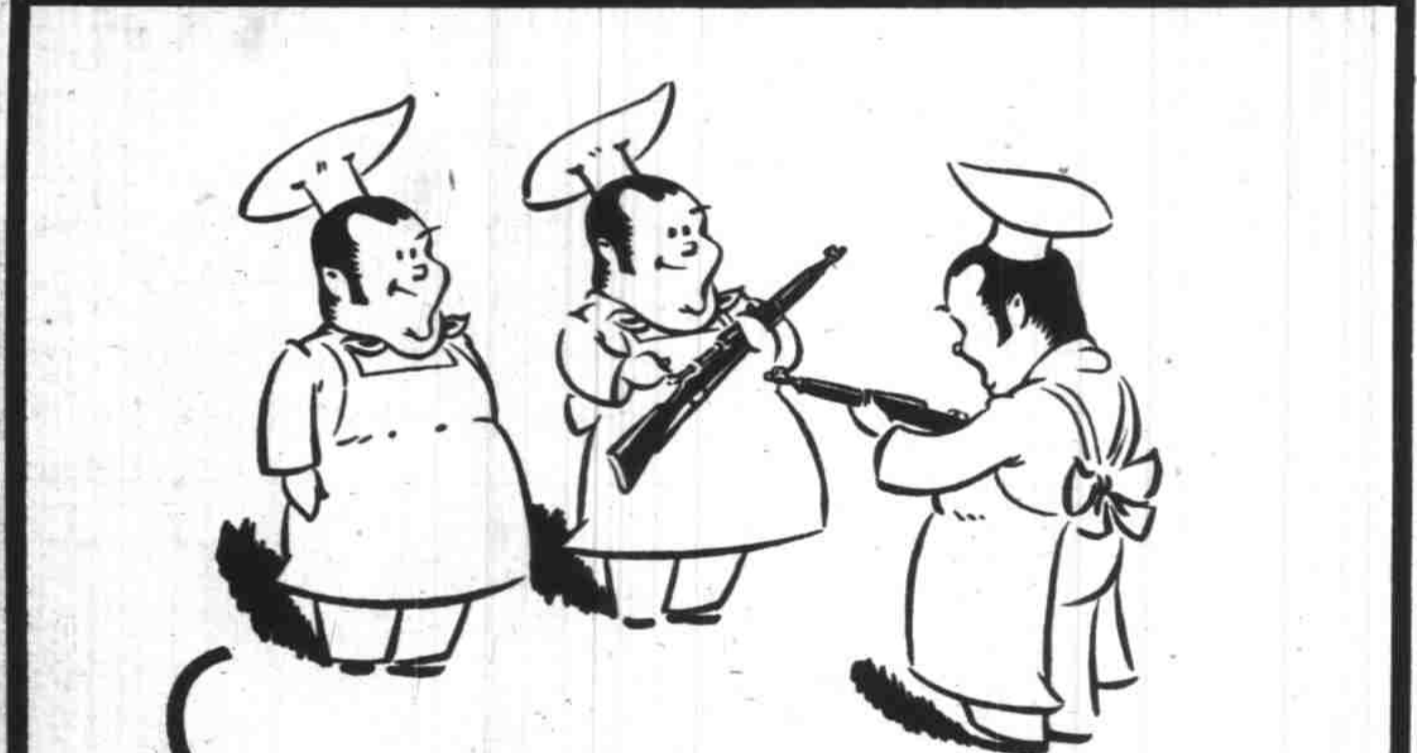
