

### Posting Names Of Absentees Urged as Cure

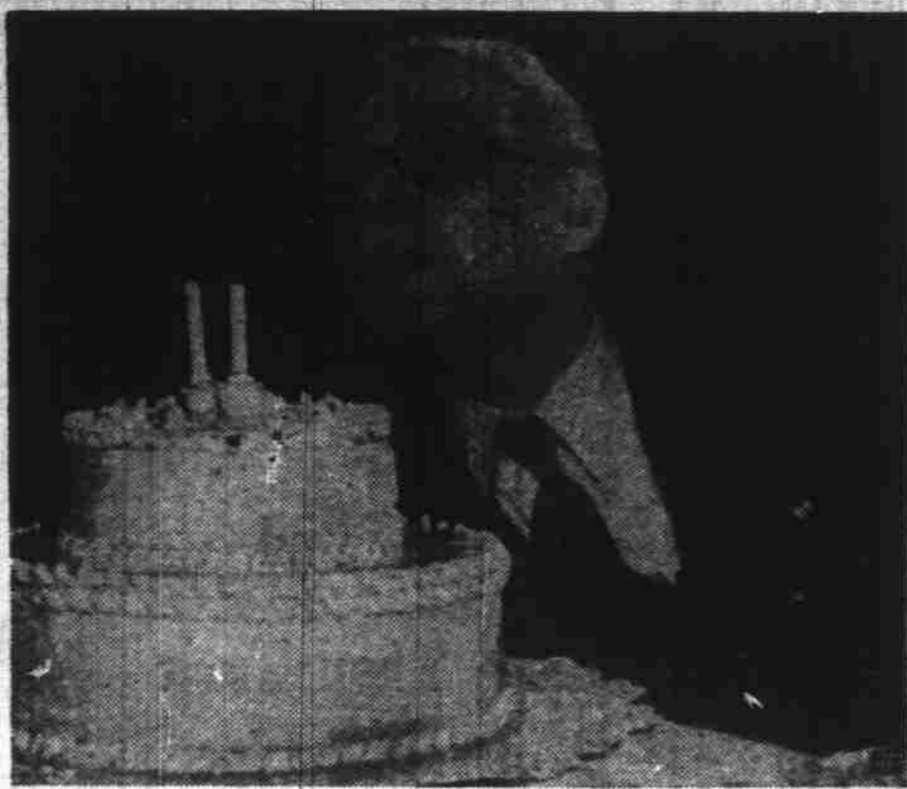
WASHINGTON, March 4.—(P)—A suggestion that names of war workers habitually absent from the job be posted in postoffices came from the head of the maritime commission Thursday while a union official urged that solving the problem of absenteeism be left to management-labor cooperation.

Testifying before the house naval committee, Chairman Emory S. Land of the government shipbuilding agency called "illegitimate absenteeism a first cousin to slackerism." He approved legislation directing that names of men of draft age who absent themselves from work without good cause be reported to selective service boards. Public posting of names of older men, he said, might deter them from absenteeism.

But N. P. Alifas, president of district 44, International Association of Machinists (AFL), contended to the committee that any legislative action against absenteeism might prove "a cure that is really worse than the disease." Organized labor is as desirous as anyone can be to eliminate absenteeism to the vanishing point," he said.

It was best, he argued, to leave the whole problem to management and labor to work out themselves.

In the house, Rep. Mary Norton (D-NK) requested permission

for the labor committee, which she heads, to undertake an investigation of "all labor conditions and labor and employer practices which affect or may affect the progress of the war production program."

As a further move to protect victory gardens, Portland city officials and humane society authorities opened a drive to pick up an estimated 13,000 unlicensed dogs. . . .

### OPA Assures Error-Fixing

Where actual errors are found to have occurred in the computation of any user's fuel oil allotment, the ration boards will re-calculate the figures, George L. Curry, district OPA fuel rationing representative announced Thursday.

Telephone and individual calls

have been received by the OPA from persons who believe their quotas were figured wrong, he reported, but when the value of the coupons, inventory on hand February 1, and how little of the actual heating season remains was explained to the complainants, in most cases they agreed their rations were determined fairly. The percentage of errors on the whole was less than actually anticipated considering the magnitude of the task, Curry declared.

Three factors determined the basic home fuel oil ration: (1) a standard heat-loss formula based on the square feet dwelling area to be heated; (2) the previous heating season's consumption reduced by the required percentage; and (3) the number of occupants in each house. The square feet formula was tested by measuring houses of all types from coast to coast, Curry explained, and was found to be equitable to the average house.
