City Prisoner Cuts Throat

Anthony L. Lorusung, about 30, of Richmond, Calif., was in Salem Deaconess hospital Friday night after cutting his throat in the city jail about 1 p. m. Friday. City first aid men said they believed he had lost large quantities of blood. Lorusung had been placed in jail Thursday night on a drunkenness charge, but was released Friday morning. He reappeared at the city hall in the afternoon, showing signs of unbalance and asking to be put back in jail. He was alone when he attempted to take his own life, police said.

Draft Charge May Be Faced

Possibility was seen Friday that federal officers may take action in the case of Gordon Sayre Little, who in Marion county circuit court pleaded guilty to one charge of forgery and to another of burglary and was given time in which to consider his pleas to two other forgery charges.

Little allegedly carried on his person at the time of his arrest three selective service registration cards, one in the name of D. E. Stone, 735 North Commercial street, under which alleged alias officers declare he operated here; another in the name of Gordon Sayre Little, Rogue River, Ore., under which name he is said to have served several penitentiary terms, and the third in the name of Thorman E. Smith, St. Louis, Mo. All three have been turned over to federal agents, officers here said Friday.

Little in court pleaded guilty to a charge of burglarizing the B&C Lumber company warehouse offices here and to issuing a forged check to Bloch's Golden Rule store. Judge E. M. Page said he would pronounce sentence March 27, would hear him plead to the other two charges March 16.
