Tax Assessor Activities Discussed

Activities of the Marion county tax assessor's office through the year were discussed and explained to members of the Salem Realty board by Deputy Assessor Paul Griebow at the organization's noon luncheon meeting Friday.

New maps on a large enough scale to allow marking of ownership pieces of ground as small as one third acre, now in the making, have already proved valuable in assessing taxes to actual owners, Griebow declared.

Marion county's 25,000 to 30,000 pieces of property must be listed and evaluated by May 2, prior to the time the board of equalization meets, when the list becomes the assessment roll. By the second Monday in June, the property values of each taxing unit must have been totaled for presentation to the state treasurer.

Budgets from all units, on file by July 15, must be checked by the assessor's office to determine whether they are within the six per cent limitation or not, the speaker explained, and then they are used to determine how great the tax assessed against each unit must be.

Corrections in assessment errors after the books have been turned over to the sheriff as the tax roll may be made only by the sheriff, Griebow said, although in this county the non-controversial corrections recommended by the assessor are accepted and made.

OREGON CITY, March 12—(AP)—Clarence M. Kramer, 51, was released from the state hospital at Salem Thursday only to be arrested by local authorities on a grand jury indictment returned in 1936 charging him with holding up a Portland used car dealer and robbing him of \$5 and his car.

Before Kramer could be arrested on the indictment in 1936 he was convicted in Washington of forgery and sent to the state penitentiary at Walla Walla. After his release, he was committed to the Oregon state hospital.

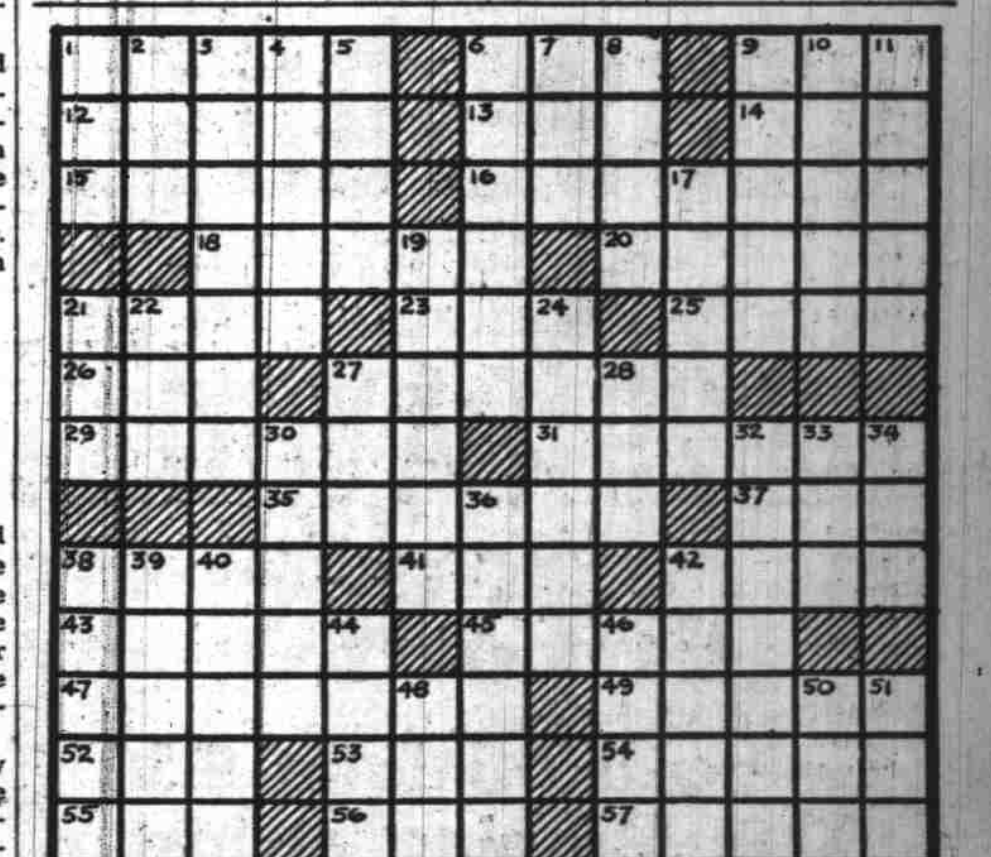
In event Steelhammer is accepted into the armed forces he will ask the Marion county court to appoint a pro tem successor.

Commitment

Said Justified

Action of the Jackson county court in committing a mother and her seven children to Fairview home was found to have been justified, in a report filed with the Oregon house of representatives on the closing day of the session by its committee on public institutions of which Rep. E. Riddell Lage was chairman.

The committee, instructed by the house to investigate this case, found that the mother and six of the children were mentally subnormal and that the mother, widowed a few months ago, had no plans for supporting the children outside of the institution. One child's intelligence was a few points above the normal upper limit for commitment to the institution.

The investigation was ordered after Rep. Vernon Bull had charged that he was denied an interview with one of these children after he, as a member of the committee, had begun an investigation of the case. He and Rep. Phil Brady refused to concur in the committee report.

License Refunds

One of Measures Signed by Snell

Gov. Earl Snell Friday signed a bill by the recent legislative session authorizing the state game commission to refund antelope hunting license fees for the year 1942. Approximately 305 of these refunds will be made by the commission.

The refunds were approved by the game commission because the antelope hunting season was closed by the governor due to hazardous fire conditions.

Another bill signed by the governor eliminates bear from the game animal classification.

A third measure receiving executive department approval allows appeals from the municipal courts to the state supreme court.

SB 231, by irrigation and drainage committee—Relating to taxation.

SB 235, by Newberry—Relating to the refund of taxes.

SB 276, by ways and means committee—Appropriating money for the Grand Army of the Republic.
