# Stocks' Week Worst in Year

### Average Off .9 Point On Week; Selling Trend Slowed

NEW YORK, March 20-(AP)-The stock market Saturday finished its worst week on average since last mid-April but selling dried up appreciably and many leaders, including Friday's weak rails, developed mild recovery tendencies.

The Associated Pres 60-stock composite was unchanged at 45.8 but on the week was off .9, largest recession since the week ended April 18, 1942. Tranfers of 484,290 shares were a minimum since Jan. 23 and compared with 829,830 last Saturday.

Among stocks in the brief proceedings Bath Iron Works and Excell-O advanced a point each to 1943 peaks. Modest improvement was shown for Southern Railway, Great Northern, US Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler and Western Union. The strong air transports of Friday took a rest. Losers included American Telephone, US Rubber, Texas Co., and International Har-


