Industrials Lead in General Advance; Market Broad

NEW YORK, March 24 .- (AP)-Industrial shares made their third straight advance Wednesday and while gains generally were in fractions there were few minus signs among leaders in that division of the stock market.

Under leadership of coppers, golds, steels, motors and rubbers the Associated Press average of 20 industrial rose 4 of a point to 65.9, rails and utilities holding unchanged.

Considerable activity in lowpriced shares-chiefly utilities which made little progress-helped boost volume to 1,161,080 shares of the full session against 1,191,970 Tuesday. Of 903 issued traded, 469






