Buyers Crowd Stock Market

Average Reaches High Since May, 1940, In Broad Session

NEW YORK, March 25-(AP) Buyers crowded the stock market Thursday and the list, on overage, hit best levels in nearly three years with breadth and activity pronounced.

The Associated Press composite of 60 stocks rose .9 of a point to 47.3, a peak since May 11, 1940. It was the sharpest day's jump since December 30, 1941. The rail average touched its highest mark since October, 1939. It was the broadest market since last December, 981 individual issues being traded. Of these 718 were up and 263 down or unchanged. Transfers totalled 2,121,410 shares against 1,161,080 the day before and were the largest since December 30, 1941. There were 308 new highs for 1943 or longer.

Conspicuous on the push were US Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Southern Railway, Chesapeake & Ohio, Goodyear, US Rubber, Goodrich, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Douglas Aircraft, International Harvester, Twentieth Century-Fox, American Smelting, Anaconda, Homestake Mining, Du Pont, Eastman Kodak, Westinghouse, Standard Oil of Indiana and American Airlines.

Drops Grains

CHICAGO, March 25-(AP)-Grain prices tumbled Thursday when strong opposition to farm bills pending in congress was expressed by Price Administrator Prentiss Brown in a letter to congressional leaders. Early gains were replaced by losses ranging to 2 cents in rye. The market opened slightly higher, reflecting overnight reaction to house passage of the Steagall-Bankhead bill to prevent deduction of benefit payments in setting price ceilings, but buying demand lagged and moderate selling soon reversed the trend. Later stop-loss orders were uncovered and the finish was near the day's

Wheat closed 11/8-13/6 lower, May \$1.44%-1/2, July \$1.45-1.44%. Traders interpreting Brown's letter as indicating a presidential veto awaited the Glass Steagill bill, which has passed both houses in slightly different form and is now back in the senate for the ironing out of these minor variations. 




