Dr. Weinzirl Stresses Health, Traces Development for PTA

MONMOUTH—Dr. Adolph Weinzirl, professor of public health and preventative medicine at the University of Oregon, who addressed students and faculty here Tuesday, and spoke Monday night to the local PTA, discussed the history of health from early days to the present time, referring to those peoples and countries which have definitely contributed to health development.

No Deferment



"I'm ready now," said Kay Kyser, popular American orchestra leader, now in Hollywood, upon learning that the appeals board had turned down a request for his deferment filed, not by Kyser but by the OWI, and that his draft board at Rocky Mount, N.C. had classified him as 1-A. Mill City Over Top

MILL CITY—Mill City went over the top in its drive for funds for the Red Cross. The goal of \$800 was surpassed when all returns counted reached \$1200. Final results are not yet known.

"Health is a rather dull subject until health is lost," he stated. The Greek interest in promoting excellent physical condition; the Roman methods of sanitation, and means of purifying water supplies—methods followed until in recent years by our own large cities—are outstanding examples of early health protection.

Following the time of the Romans came the dark ages, when filth and plagues were prevalent until the Renaissance brought forth new developments in science. Disease was found to be communicable; some diseases were proved to be nutritional, as Dr. Cook's round-the-world voyages disclosed. Cook's crew was liberally provided with fruit and only one man aboard died, while on other ships of that period as many as half of the crew perished.

The first public health department was organized in Boston in 1790. The first general board of health in England was organized in 1848 to combat poor living and health conditions caused by industrial expansion. Methods of preventing cholera by Dr. Herman Bates, in New York, in 1892, who ordered ships coming from cholera-infested ports quarantined and passengers examined before landing in this country, was a dramatic achievement in medical progress. The Boer and Spanish-American wars proved that disease was more deadly than bullets. Construction of the Panama canal is a monument of success to preventive medicine as well as to the skill of army engineers.

Dr. Weinzirl assured college students that their life expectancy is twice as long as it was in the time of their grandparents.

"Successful health is possible if we take advantage of the health conservation available to us," were the doctor's concluding remarks.

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
