Miss Ruth Bedford will present her piano students in recital on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock in the Carrier room of the Methodist church.

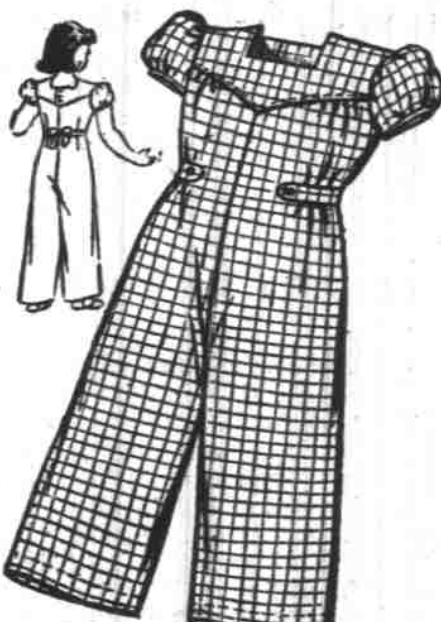

Today's Menu

Spinach ring with creamed hard cooked eggs in the center will make a fine main dish and handsome center of the day's menu on meatless Tuesday.

Fresh fruit cup
Paprika crackers

Last of several jars of fruit make excellent meal beginners when they are chilled well and made into fruit cup. Fresh fruit tastes good too.

Steam spinach that's been cut up with scissors or a knife, and when done, arrange on a large plate or platter in a ring. Fill center with hard cooked egg, creamed. Sprinkle with paprika, or reserve a yolk to grate over the top for color.

Save Celery Flavor Is Fine

This writer has frequently lauded the versatility of green celery, all the time keeping tongue in cheek to indicate that we don't expect to be taken altogether seriously. But now that the time has come, when every single piece of precious celery leaf and stem must be carefully used, or saved for future use, it's our cue to say "I told you so."

At nearly half a dollar a head, even the most skeptical of women will be planning ways to use every smidgen of celery stalk, each wisp of leaf.

First we eat the inner stalks raw, either au naturel or stuffed with some form of soft cheese or sandwich spread. The next coarser stalks we cut up and put with other vegetables or with apples in salad.

The very outer stalks are either cut up and stewed and seasoned with butter or mixed with cream sauce and used over biscuits for a main dish on a meatless day.

Leaves make grand flavor in stews and soups, and all except brown or spoiled ones are usable.

Cut leaves with knife or scissors, cook with meat or stew in water until soft. The leaves not only give excellent flavor to the

soup or stew, but cook up to a good consistency to eat.

As a final thrust in our "save the celery" campaign, let's remind you that if you do have any celery leaves left, spread them out on the top of the stove to dry, then crumble and use for seasoning anytime they're needed.
