### Speaker on Indians Here

Miss Bertha M. Eckert, secretary for Indian work, on the staff of the national board, Young Women's Christian association, New York, will arrive in Salem Thursday afternoon, for several days' visit, during which time she will discuss with officials of the local association and those of the Chemawa Indian school the war problems facing young Indian women. Miss Eckert recently concluded a three-month tour through the Dakotas, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Illinois, and is thoroughly familiar with the present situation as it affects Indians in reservations, in war factories and in civilian jobs.

Miss Eckert has served the national board in her present capacity for twenty-four years. Previously she taught in Boston, Mass., at Leland University in New Orleans, and at the Bacone Indian College in Oklahoma. She is a graduate of Wellesley college and is affiliated with the Indian rights association, the American Association of University Women, the New York Wellesley club, National Indian association and the Foreign Policy association.

District Manager J. Edgar Reay is asking all members who can to sign up for the Red Cross Blood Donor Drive.

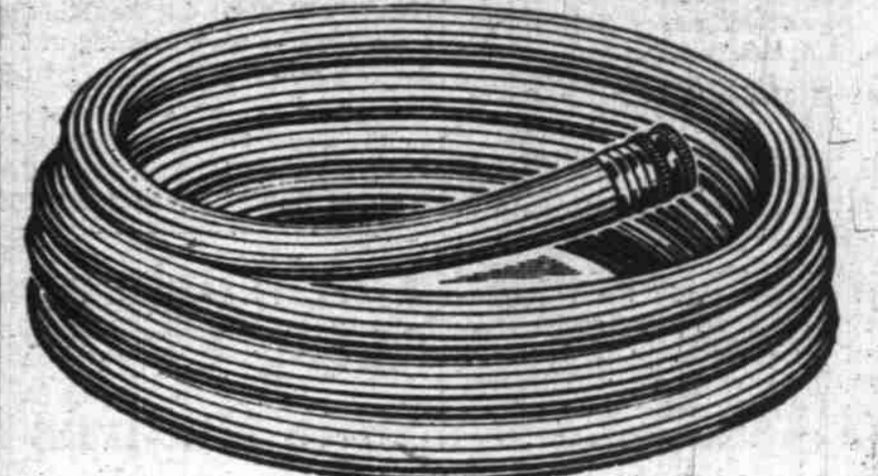
