

Market Holds Despite Sales

Specialties Register Sizable Gains; Utilities Rise.

NEW YORK, April 22.—(AP)—The stock market was steady Thursday in the face of a fair amount of profit selling and rubber shares and specialties registered sizable gains.

Best prices were shaded in many instances and some leaders closed slightly lower.

The usual good Friday suspension of business led to some scaling down of speculative commitments.

Dealings totaled 1,249,290 shares compared with 1,141,368 the previous day. The Associated Press 60 stock average rose .1 of a point to 48.8.

Utilities had another interval of activity. Steels, a little ahead at one time, finished about even. Aircrafts were better and rails mixed.

US Rubber closed 1 1/2 higher and Goodyear rose a point. Du Pont had a similar rise. Moderately higher were Chrysler, Goodrich, Douglas, General Electric, and Standard Oil of NJ.

In lower ground were General Motors, American Can, Dow Chemical, Allied Chemical and Great Northern.

Grains Firm For Holiday

CHICAGO, April 22.—(AP)—In the usual dull pre-holiday trade, grain prices firmed Thursday on moderate buying coming from commission houses. Interest in the market was small in view of Friday's good Friday holiday.

At the close wheat was up 1/4, May \$1.44 1/4, July 1.43 1/4-5/8, corn was unchanged at ceilings, May \$1.05, oats advanced 1/4-5/8 and rye was up 1/4-5/8.

Trading in the May corn contract was restricted at the maximum and grain men said the market appeared to be back where it was before OPA lifted ceilings.

There was little news to influence wheat prices, either from the growing belt or Washington. Traders were interested in seeing how much warehouse stored loan wheat may be redeemed before April 30, when government loans on such wheat mature. It is estimated that between 100,000,000 and 160,000,000 will come into government hands.

There was good buying in the May oats contract, apparently based on strong demand for cash grain.

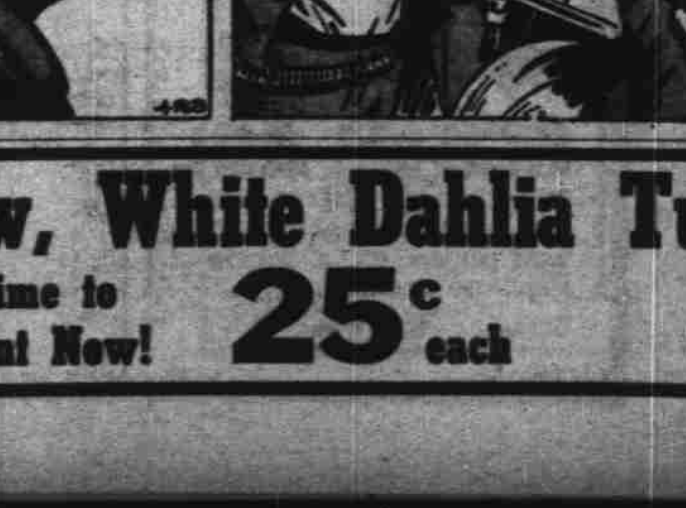
