

WLB Officer Tells Wage Conditions

PORTLAND, April 22.—(P)—Wages were not put in a straight-jacket by President Roosevelt's hold-the-line order, Dr. George Bernard Noble, chairman of the 15th regional war labor board, told business men here.

The board will grant pay increases to workers qualifying under the national WLB's "little steel" formula, getting substandard wages or earning raises for merit, he said.

Plants which have not advanced wages more than 15 per cent since Jan. 1, 1941, are eligible to give pay increases under the "little steel formula," he explained at a conference.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(P)—A republican food study subcommittee reported Wednesday that unless OPA "acts immediately" to fix ceiling prices on fruits and vegetables for canners and farmers, production available to civilians will be cut to 45 per cent of 1942 levels.

Prompt action by the OPA "could increase the figure to 60 per cent", the committee reported through its chairman, Rep. Landis (R-Ind.).
