ALBANY, April 24. — (AP) — Carl Curlee, secretary of the Albany chamber of commerce, notified chamber officials from Spokane that he was invited by Sen. Mon C. Wallgren (D-Wash) to attend an informal hearing Saturday of the Truman subcommittee in connection with selection of Albany for an electro-metallurgical laboratory.

PORTLAND, April 24. — (AP) — For the second time in his life David

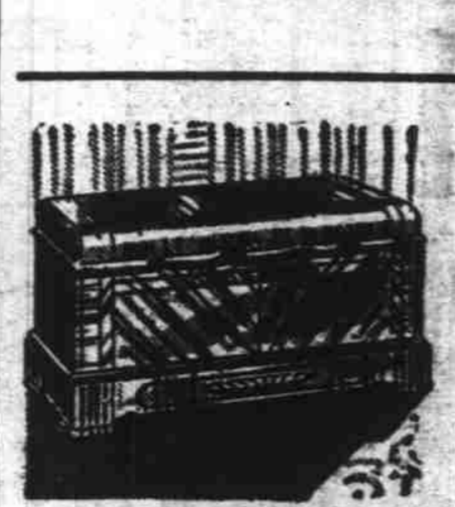
B. Geddes Sunday will observe his birthday on Easter. He will be 88.

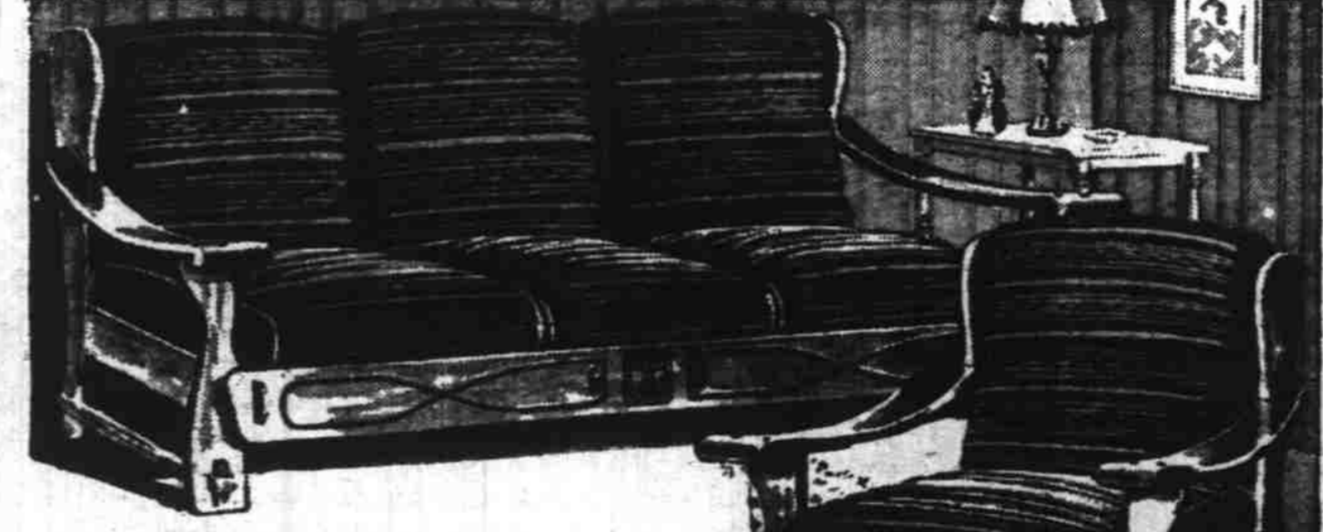

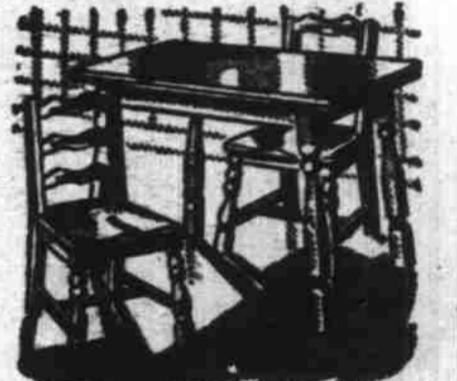

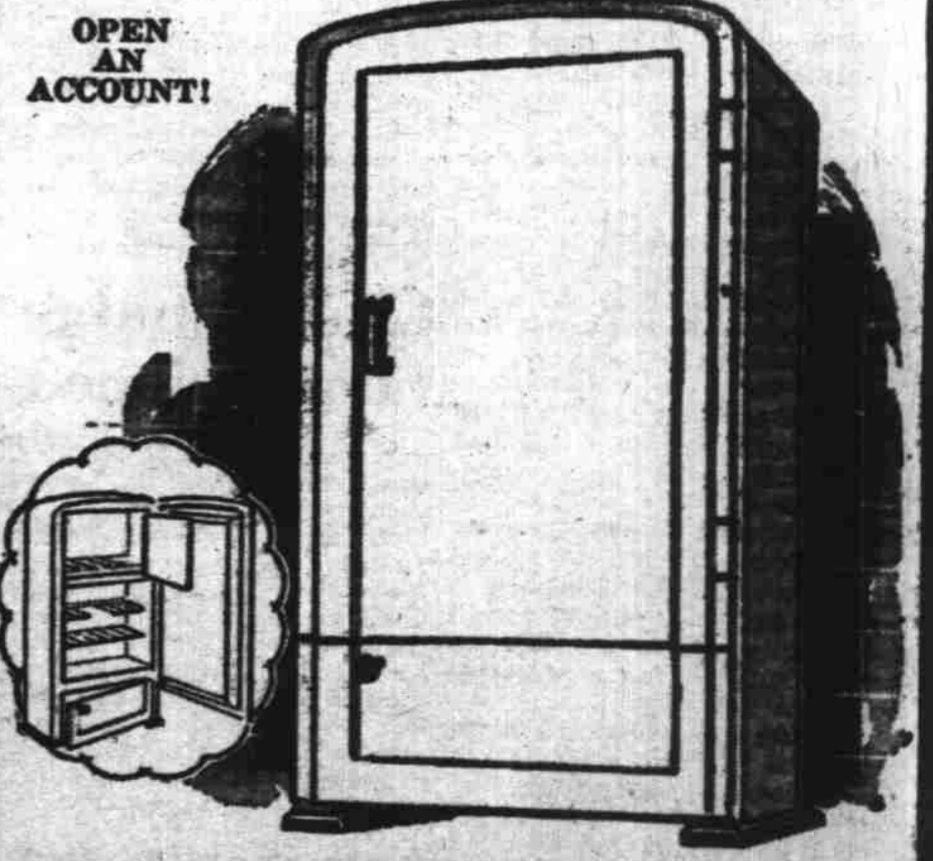
