Motors, Rails, Steel **And Aircrafts Lead** Afternoon Climb

Rallies Market

NEW YORK, April 29-(AP)-The stock market rallied Thursday as the president announced a strong position on the coal labor dispute. Motors, rails, steels and aircrafts led the revival which came after midday. Hesitancy ruled at the opening. Profit cashing appeared on the upswing but dealings quickened in the final hour and favorites finished at or near the day's best levels with gains of fractions to a point or so.

Allegheny common led the active sprinters, coming out in the last few minutes on blocks of 10,000 to 20,000 shares and finishing with a net advance of 1/2 at 2.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .4 of a point at 49.2, its first plus sign this week. The market was relatively broad, 899 individual issues being traded. Of these 585 were up, 122 down and 192 unchanged. Transfers totalled 1,340,820 shares.



Sheep Fleeces Underweight, Clip Reveals

SCIO-Goat and sheep shearing is progressing in the Scio locality, insofar as weather permits. Fleeces this season are weighing considerably below the Willamette valley average of eight pounds apiece, due to severe weather and poor feeding conditions during the past winter. Shearers are receiving 20 cents per head for their work, a fee five cents in advance of that paid for the 1942 clip. The current clip is under contract at about 46 cents per pound, the government to purchase all wool not contracted prior to April 24.
