OATMEAL COOKIES
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup sour milk or buttermilk
2 teaspoon soda
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups rolled oats
1 cup raisins
1 cup walnuts
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Cream shortening, add sugar, add egg and beat well. Sift flour, salt and soda and add alternately with milk. Add rolled oats, raisins and chopped nut meats. Drop on oiled cookie sheet and bake 15 minutes in 400-degree oven.

Speaker Tells of Life in Europe During Early Part of War

In a charmingly informal manner, Mrs. Michael Tchenoff revealed the story of her experiences in Europe during the early days of the war, for the fortunate members and guests of the Salem Junior Women's club who heard her at the clubhouse Monday. Mrs. Tchenoff, who has lived in Russia, Germany, France, Switzerland and Spain, told her listeners of life in those countries during the rise of Hitler to power, and the German occupation. Following three months in Germany at the beginning of the Hitler regime, the Tchenoff family lived in France, leaving Paris only a few hours before the arrival of the Germans, and arriving several days later with only a few blankets and small possessions in a little town in the Pyrenees on the Spanish border, where they resided for several months until passports could be secured for a trip to the United States. Before sailing for America they had to cross Spain into Portugal, and Mrs. Tchenoff gave a vivid picture of the sharp contrast of poverty and wealth seen there. The difficulties of the people in the war-torn countries were brought home to the listeners by the speaker, and realization that this is a war to the finish was clearly felt. Mrs. Tchenoff, who arrived in New York City in 1941 with her family, came west with her husband several months ago and makes her home in Salem while Mr. Tchenoff maintains an interest in a lumber mill near Sheridan.

The sum of \$10 was added to the war fund by the sale of memberships in the Community Concert Association.
