Market Drop

AP Average Advances .2 at 50.1; Week's Decline Cut to .6

NEW YORK, May 15-(AP)-Waning of short-war psychology Saturday helped stem the downward stock market shift and enabled many leaders to finish the week on a modest recovery note.

Wall street, while still somewhat bearishly inclined, reinstated commitments here and there as British officials warned that it would be unwise to imagine recent big allied victories meant the world conflict was approaching its conclusion. The better coal labor outlook provided a milk prop although thoughts of mounting taxes and corporate costs kept many customers in neutral territory.

While scattered favorites jumped 1 to 5 points, closing gains generally were in fractions and a number of minus signs showed up when the final gong sounded.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was ahead .2 of a point at 50.1 but on the week suffered a net decline of .6. Transfers towere the highest for a short session since December 27, 1941.

Wheat Leads **Grain Rise**

CHICAGO, May 15-(AP)-Wheat led an advance in grains Saturday when a small amount of buying, some of which was regarded as short-covering, found the market with a scarcity of offerings. All of the previous session's loss was re-covered on the upturn.

At the close wheat was 1/2-1 cent higher, May \$1,43%, July \$1,42-\$1.41%, corn was unchanged at ceilings, May \$1.05, oats were 1/8 lower to % higher and rye was up

Technical factors were considered as much responsible for the wheat upturn as anything else, for prices had sunk to new lows since last February and were about nine cents under 1943 highs when the market Friday. Much of the seasonal liquidation appeared to be out-of-the-way.




