BAKED RICE PUDDING

2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1/2 cup rice
1/2 teaspoon vanilla, or
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg or
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup raisins

Cook rice until tender in rapidly boiling, salted water. Drain; wash rice with cold water. Beat eggs slightly; scald milk and pour slowly into egg, stirring constantly. Combine with other ingredients and pour into a baking dish. Set dish in a pan of hot water and bake at 325 degrees about one hour, or until a silver knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 6.

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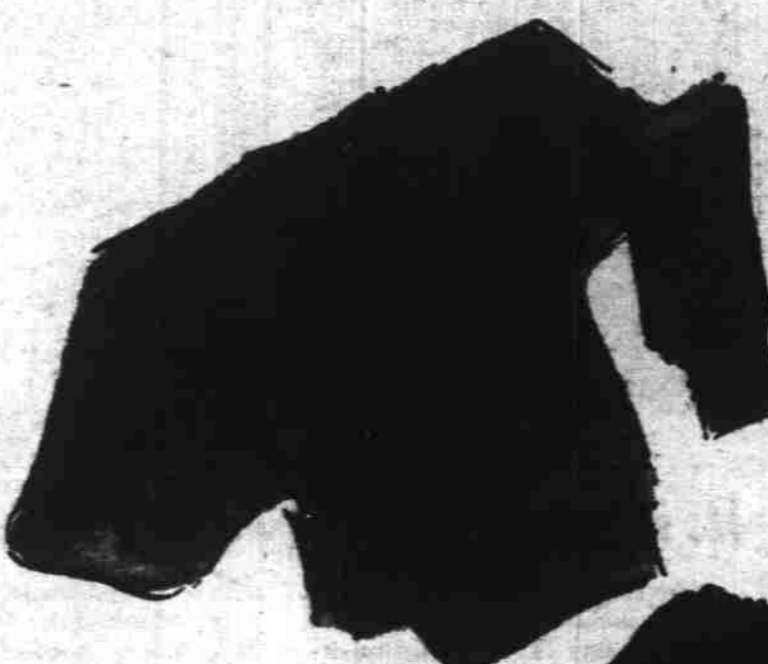

THE OLD JUDGE SAYS...



"Our men in the service in this war have pretty definite ideas about what they're fighting for and the way they want to find our country when they come back... don't you think so, Judge?"
