# Late Selling **Cuts Profits**

#### AP Average Off .1 At 50.8; Several **Touch New Peaks**

NEW YORK, May 20.-(AP)-Stocks found nice going in the early part of Tuesday's market but encountered enough profit taking bumps toward the finish to cut initial gains of a point or more and put many steels, rails, motors and blue chips in the minus column.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off .1 of a point at 50.8. Final advances and declines were pretty evenly split. The rail composite suffered a recession of .3 of a point while that for the industrials and utilities were without variation. It was somewhat broader market, 927 individual issues being traded. Of these 350 were up, 342 down and 235 unchanged. Transfers to 1,-298,770 shares against 1,493,300 Wednesday.

Among favorites touching peaks for the year or longer and ending with modest improvement were Loew's, Warner Bros., Omnibus Corp., Air Reduction, Sears Roebuck and Westinghouse.

Prominent lowers included Nickel Plate, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Western Un-ion, International Harvester and US Rubber.
